OTTAWA (CP)—A widespread search for letters written by Sir John A. Macdonald, Canada's first prime minister, will be started by the public archives for inclusion in a series of publications to be known as the papers of the prime ministers.

Launched as a centennial project, the publications will include correspondence written and received by Canada's prime ministers from Macdonald to Louis St. Laurent. The project is expected to take 20 years to complete, the archives said Wednesday.
