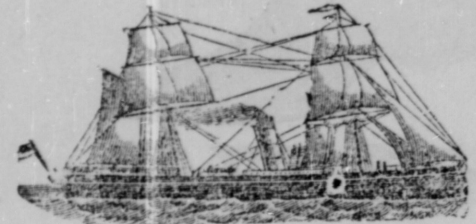

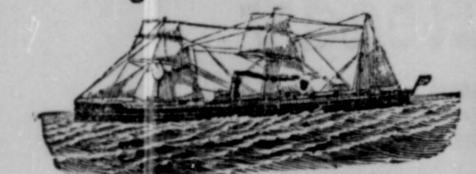

Of Special Interest to our Farmers

Comfort Essential at all Seasons.

"Get comfort for the cow," is the dairyman's first commandment, and any dairyman worthy of the name readily acknowledges that the commandment applies to him—in the winter time. There is no hesitancy in admitting that proper observance includes getting all the comfort to be had at all times, and under all conditions—in the winter time.

The real dairyman knows that the calf is mother to the cow, and that proper care of the cow begins before the calf is born. He knows that the cow-mother should be liberally fed during the period of gestation, on blood, bone and milk producing food, for keeping up the vigor of the cow and giving full nourishment and development to the calf.

He knows that ten days before the cow is due to calve she should be put in a box stall or stable by herself, that she should be given a light diet and every comfort—in the winter. He knows that the calf should be kept in a dry, warm, well-bedded, well-ventilated, sunlit stable, and given just the right kind and quantity of food for producing a well developed dairy cow—in the winter time. He knows that the profitable production of milk depends, not only upon the use of a cow that can produce, but on the cow that is made to produce all that she can, and that skilful feeding and watering, kind treatment and careful attention to every minute detail affecting her comfort and health, are absolutely essential—in the winter time.

But when summer time comes he does not know much, at least he does not commonly act as if he did. He is apt to turn the cows out on the pasture ten or fifteen days before he should. The little grass they get is soft and watery and does far more harm than good. The cows get off their feed and there is a shrinkage in the yield of milk which is but slowly recovered. He is apt to discontinue the grain ration too soon, even if it should be discontinued at all, and there is another shrinkage; and then a little later the heat of the sun becomes oppressive, and flies begin to get bad, and then a drought sets in and the pasture gets dry and short, and the water supply is neither convenient or abundant and fresh, and no extra pasture or soiling crop has been provided to bridge over the long dry spell which is sure to come, and the cows stand in the broiling hot sun and suffer and fight flies, and perhaps wade hock deep in mud to get a drink of hot water from a stagnant pond, and there is another big shrinkage in the milk yield, and about time look out for the conclusion that dairying don't pay—in summer time.

He is apt to realize when it is too late that he has not done all he should have done to get comfort for the cow, but he has the satisfaction of the man whose fruit was killed by a frost, "it saved a heap of trouble gathering the peaches."

It seems strange that dairymen, many of whom do fairly well by their cows and calves in winter, do not realize that the profitable production of milk from a good cow depends on intelligent management at all times, in summer as well as in winter.

It surely should not take an intelligent dairyman long to find out that cows and calves should not be turned on pasture until the grass is well grown, and has good heart and substance; that abundant, fresh, pure water is as necessary as good feed, that in the stable or in the shade, is the place for cows and

calves during the heat of the day, that window screens are as necessary in the stable as in the dwelling, and that an abundant and palatable milk ration and careful attention to the comfort of the cow and calf are as indispensable to success to profitable milk production, in summer as in winter.

The dairyman's first commandment requires all the year round observance. Get comfort for the cow and get it all the time. And while you're getting, get plenty.

Do not feed decayed vegetables to either swine or cattle. Rotten potatoes, turnips, etc., are only valuable to the manure heap. It is especially dangerous to feed decayed food to animals carrying young.

G. L. Bryant of Nunda, Ill., is an advocate of hauling manure to the field every day when the stables are cleaned. He finds it a great convenience to have the big job off his hands when spring comes, and he believes the farther away from the stables the manure is taken the better it is for his milk.

A good example as to cleanliness and care, set by two or three leading patrons is sure to be followed by the more careless ones. Men don't like to lag behind.
