THOUGHTS FOR OUR TIME

BY HIS EMINENCE CARDINAL McGUIGAN

OBSCENE BOOKS ROB MEN OF SPIRITUAL STRENGTH

In a comprehensive listing of the factors in the educative process there appears one factor that is designated by the somewhat ponderous phrase, "aperceptive mass."

For, after remarking on the school, the home, the teacher and the student as elements that must be considered in the process leading to physical mental and spiritual maturity (it goes without saying that religion is a very important factor in this process and one that is unfortunately overlooked or neglected to a great extent) educators are forced by experience to explore an informal factor.

Environment, social pressures, parental and adult attitudes to which the child is exposed, unpleasant experiences, types of recreation, exert a powerful influence on an individual. These influences are grouped under the title aperceptive mass because to a great extent they are unconsciously felt and reflected.

The existence of this factor has long been recognized, as ancient literature testifies; the importance of it and the need to control it has always been the concern of all conscientious people and the Church.

DISCIPLINE The formal aspects of education would give the child, according to his ability, the tools and knowledge to understand life and to react reasonably to life situations and problems. This involves discipline of the mind and body, to which discipline men can be adverse.

The informal aspects, called aperceptive above, do not make these demands and so insinuate themselves on the principal of line of least resistance.

The problem of homework versus television or movies illustrates the point. The ease with which one can submit to these undemanding influences has the further detrimental effect of inspiring dislike for the demands of formal education.

In the case of one of these influences, obscene magazines and books, the effect is even more devastating. For they rob their devotees of spiritual strength and perspective, make them slaves to sensual impulses and curiosity, and by stimulating this tendency, concentrate their energies and thoughts on one small and by no means most important or most human aspect of living.

COMMENDS CLEAN UP History, and not only ancient history, only too graphically corroborates that statement. Conscientious men and women everywhere are aware of this insidious danger and are taking steps to combat it. I would like to commend the recent effort in this matter here in our city and encourage the continuance and expansion of such a noble campaign.

Another of these influences which is less tangible and yet very apparent in its effects on all classes of people is that of fashion. And fashion here is used in a broad sense to include fashions in behavior. Perhaps social convention would be a better word.

As the summer season starts, under the pretext of fashion or style or convention which places comfort and pleasure as the supreme good, some people will shift, as it were, to summer morals.

INDECENCY Because they have not thought out and considered fully their dignity as rational creatures and as sons of God and their consequent responsibilities, they will disregard the natural law of
