Johnny Longden Has Leg Broken For Second Time

DEL MAR, Calif. (AP) — Johnny Longden, the world's leading jockey, broke his right leg in a riding accident for the second time in two years Sunday.

Longden, who gives his age as 49, was thrown against the rail of the Del Mar racetrack during a Sunday morning workout on a colt named Gallant Royal.

The veteran jockey's leg was broken above the knee. Last year it was broken lower down in a race on the same track when a filly named Royal Vaca reared with him in the starting gate.

Royal Vaca and Gallant Royal are from the same line.

HIP CAST

Longden was taken to Scripps Hospital at La Jolla where surgeons reported that his leg will be in a cast up to the hip.

It was considered here as probable that the accident may end his riding career. He has been quoted, although he later denied it, as saying he planned to retire after riding at Santa Anita this year.

Longden was working out Gallant Royal for the Alberta Ranches, Ltd., of Canada when the colt reared into the rail at the quarter post. Longden's leg was crushed against the rail as the collapsing colt tore out railing and post.

Gallant Royal died, apparently of a heart attack, at the scene of his collapse.

Yanks Nats Split Bill; Tribe Shades White Sox

Pete Ramos, a slim right-handed hurler for Washington Senators, ran his shutout string over New York to 22 1-3 innings with a six-hit, 1-0 decision over the Yankees Sunday. But the Bronx Bombers came roaring back to win the nightcap 7-0.

The split reduced the Yankees' magic number to six for yet another American League pennant. Any combination of New York victories and/or losses by second-place Chicago White Sox totalling six makes it nine flags in 10 years for Yankee manager Casey Stengel.

Chicago lost 4-3 Sunday to Cleveland. Boston beat Baltimore 6-5 in 10 innings and Kansas City battered around in the ninth inning to edge Detroit 3-2.

In the National League, leading Milwaukee and second-place Pittsburgh split a double bill as the Braves maintained their 7 1/2-game bulge. Southpaw Warren Spahn won his 19th game, 3-1, in the opener, and the Pirates took the nightcap 4-1.

WINNING FOR DYKES

Meanwhile the fourth-place Cincinnati Redlegs continued to make their new acting manager, Jimmy Dykes, seem like a genius. They beat Philadelphia 6-4 and 9-2, for 12 wins in their last 14 games. Chicago Cubs em-

ployed their favorite weapon, the home run, to bang out a double win over third-place San Francisco, 6-4 and 4-1. At St. Louis, the Los Angeles Dodgers belted five home runs to beat the Cards 7-5.

Ramos (14-13) who blanked the Yanks 3-0 in their last meeting, was hot again Sunday, despite a 54-minute interruption in the opening game because of rain. Bobby Shantz was the loser, as Roy Sievers doubled and scored the only run on an infield out.

Duke Mas held the Senators to four singles in the second contest, in which Tony Kubek and Elston Howard homered.

A pinch-single by Bob Avila in the eighth inning sent home two Cleveland runs and tagged Chicago's Dick Donovan with his 13th defeat. Roy Narleski, second of three Indian pitchers, picked up his 12th win against 10 losses.

At Baltimore, a 10th-inning double off Mil Pappas by Frank Malzone drove in the winning run for Boston. Two-run homers by Bill Renna and Pete Runnels paced the 12-hit Boston attack. Dave Sisler, the winner, evened his record at 8-8.

Kansas City's three-run rally sent Frank Lary down to defeat. The Detroit righthander had given up four hits before the deadly ninth inning. Red Wilson homered with one aboard off Ray Herbert to give Detroit a 2-0 lead in the eighth.

Wes Covington drove in all three Milwaukee runs to boost Spahn's record to 19-10. Pittsburgh reliever Roy Face choked off a ninth-inning Brave rally in the second game to save Vernon Law's 12th victory. Bob Skinner drove in three of the four Pirate runs. Lew Burdette, who had won five straight, suffered his 10th loss.

Ed Bailey's three-run homer in the ninth sent Philadelphia's ace reliever, Dick Farrell, down to another defeat, and earned Hal Jeffcoat his sixth victory against six losses. In the second game,

Bombers, Eskimos Weekend Victors

Winnipeg Blue Bombers, showing a devastating ground assault and a better-than-usual passing attack, walloped Saskatchewan Roughriders 27-6 Saturday night in one of two Western Interprovincial Football Union games.

In the other contest, played in Vancouver, Edmonton Eskimos overcame their championship drought of other years, grinding out a 27-7 win over B.C. Lions.

The Bomber win was a costly one. The team lost the services of crashing fullback Gerry James in the remainder of the season. James, W.F.U. scoring champion last year and twice winner of Canadian player of the year award, suffered a double fracture of the left leg when tackled by Rider fullback Jack Hill in the third quarter. James had just taken a short pass from teammate Leo Lewis when the mishap occurred.

Despite the loss of James and the ejection of Lewis for fighting minutes later in the third quarter, Bombers were never in doubt as they scored their fourth in six starts to go into a first-place tie in points with the Calgary Stampeders.

Stamps, however, have two games in hand and sport a 4-0 record.

It was Riders' second loss in three games. They now occupy third place.

Bombers' touchdowns were split among fullback Charlie Shepard and halves Lewis, Gordie Rowland and Ron Latourle. Shepard also booted a single and James two converts before his accident.

Lions opened the scoring at 2:18 of the first quarter when Ed Vereb cracked over for their only touchdown.

Edmonton dominated the game thereafter.
