China Point Wharf.

The Patriot is to the relief of our representatives in the matter of China Point wharf. It would be much wiser to draw the pall of silence over their actions!

Our contemporary asks why this work was not let in March last? This question is easily answered. The money was not voted until April, and did not become available until after the 1st of July, after which plans and specifications had to be prepared, an examination of the work having to be made for that purpose.

If Mr. Welsh had not played the fool about the work, it might have been attended to earlier. He came home in the spring of 1888, with a cock and bull story, that he had secured a vote for China Point wharf, but the estimates gave a flat contradiction to his word. When the work was not going on in the autumn of 1888, as it would have been if Mr. Welsh's story were true, he told the people that Mr. Ferguson had caused the money he obtained for China Point wharf to be diverted to Halliday's and other places. Of course this was untrue, as the money had never been obtained.

The people of China Point knew very well that it was not until Hon. Mr. Ferguson went to Ottawa in February last to urge the matter that anything was done; and that it was Mr. Ferguson, and not the representatives of the County, that obtained the grant.

The Patriot strives ingeniously to turn the point by saying that if all this be true, the Government must be "knaves" in refusing to attend to important public works because the County returned Opposition members. We believe the Government would listen to the requests of our members if they would make honest representations. These, we are sure, they have not made. Their policy is to assume a bellicose attitude, or "damn" a work "with faint praise,"—as they did regarding the proposed wharf at Mount Stewart, and then blame the Government because their wants are not attended to.

We are assured that in February last, and again soon after the first of July, Mr. Ferguson urged upon the Department the importance of having temporary provision made for the fall trade at China Point.

Notes and Clippings.

The official returns show that the consumption of spirits in Canada is on the wane; that more beer and tobacco are used.

There are said to be many Provincialists unemployed in Boston at the present time. Some of these people, lured by deceitful promises, have left good situations here, and now find themselves without employment in a foreign land. Many will return, sadder and wiser for their experience, and resolved to make the best of their opportunities in their own land.

The Farmers' Loan and Trust Company of Kansas failed a short time since. About \$3,000,000 had been loaned by the company on farm properties, four-fifths of them in Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado, and Dakota. Farm mortgages are generally considered safe investments; the security behind them does not in Canada either run away or be blown away; and generally does not, even under unfavorable circumstances, deteriorate much in value. In the Western States the security does not appear to be so good. The agent sent west to personally inspect matters reports that the farm property mortgaged was in most part worthless, that many of the borrowers had left their buildings, and the buildings stood deserted and looted, and many of them were in ruins. Here is a revelation!

A "Woman's Suffrage Convention" was held at Saratoga a few days ago. Less than a dozen delegates attended, and there were only about forty persons present at a public meeting held in connection therewith. The women of the states are, evidently, content that the political mill shall be run by the men. No doubt they will continue to do what they can to influence the men.

A BUDGET OF GENERAL NEWS FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD.

BRainerd, Minn., Oct. 7.—Word has been received from the Indian commissioners at Millelacs reservation that these Indians have at last signed a treaty which will open some of the richest lands in the country to settlement. This adds about four million acres to the domains in addition to that secured from the Sioux.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—Mr. Goschen is making a tour of the southwest portion of Ireland to glean facts to assist him in drafting a new land bill.

CHICAGO, Oct. 7.—Despatches from several points report a terrific storm on Lake Huron yesterday. It is feared that several vessels have gone down. A number are ashore.

BELGRADE, Oct. 7.—EX-Queen Natalie has resolved to face every consequence of her defiance of the government. She will decline to accept any decision of the Skuptschina restricting her stay in Serbia. She contends that the ordinary Skuptschina is not qualified to interfere in the matter.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—Daniel O'Donoghue of the Glens, commonly called "The O'Donoghue," is dead. He represented Tipperary in Parliament from 1857 to 1865 and sat for Tralee from 1865 to 1885.

PARIS, Oct. 7.—The latest estimate of the new chamber of deputies is 365 Republican and 211 opposition members. The estimate includes colonial members. Temps says it considers the time propitious for a policy of reconciliation toward all classes with a view to the consolidation of the republic and the permanent establishment of peace and order.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—An election was held in Peterborough to-day to fill the parliamentary seat made vacant by the death of Hon. William J. W. Fitzwilliam. It resulted in the return of Morton, Gladstonian candidate.

Presbyterian Synod.

GRATIFYING EVIDENCES OF THE CHURCH'S FINANCIAL GROWTH.

At the recent session of the Presbyterian Synod at Moncton, reports showed that 225 students were in attendance at the Halifax Ladies' College, and J. G. Forbes testified to the popularity of the college in New Brunswick.

The report on systematic beneficence showed that arrears of minister's salaries are becoming smaller. There is also progress in the methods of raising ministers' salaries. Sixty congregations have adopted the weekly offerings system.

Recommendations advising proportionate giving, the adoption of the weekly offering system, the teaching of scriptural principles of giving and the discountenancing of all unscriptural methods of raising money for churches were adopted. Fifty-four congregations apply for aid from the augmentation fund, and to which \$9,476 has been voted. Never before were so few aid receiving congregations pastorless. New Brunswick is asked to contribute—St. John \$1,200; Miramichi \$575; P. E. Island \$975; Newfoundland \$400. Nova Scotia will give the balance.

The Synod will meet next year with St. John's Church, Moncton.
