A. Zimmerman, who broke the World's record for the quarter mile. In the first heat of the mile safety sweep, W. W. Windle, scratch man, set the world's record—2.33 2-5. In the quarter mile safety race Herlis broke the world's record in the competition, making a quarter in 33.5. Zimmerman equalled the world's time in the last heat of the same race. FIRE DAMAGES.—A. Bain, of Halifax, agent for the Boston and Charlotetown fire insurance, was here last week, says the Halifax Herald, to see the widow of the late Edward LeBlanc, who was killed on the steamer Indiana last spring, about her claim for damages from the company for the killing of her husband. Mr. Bain offered her \$2,000 settlement of her claim, but she refused to accept so small an amount. On the 11th of August the vessel was struck by a heavy sea and thrown on her beam ends. The cargo shifted and shortly after the vessel was ordered, scarcely giving the crew time to escape, saving nothing at all. They drifted about 60 miles to Cape Race, arriving in an exhausted condition, as they had no food nor water for 35 hours. Their vessel was repaired and consequently the crew was able to return to the owner. THE DUCAL CASTLE.—The following particulars have been received from Bermuda relative to the experience of the steamer Duke of Devonshire in a hurricane: During the passage from Halifax the steamer Duke of Devonshire, experienced a severe hurricane, which lasted for several hours. A sea boarded the ship, and two seamen, Sexton and Murphy, by name, were washed overboard near the moon at the time and would have been washed overboard had not the captain engaged in the ship's rail and grasped the rigging of the smokestack. SAD NEWS FROM QUEBEC.

Corporal Macdonald Killed.

This morning a telegram from Quebec to Captain D. Stewart conveyed the sad intelligence that a gun fell upon Corporal Rufus Macdonald, at the Island of Orleans yesterday, during the competition, injuring him so badly that he died this morning. The telegram did not give any particulars as to how the accident occurred. The team will arrive home on Saturday evening, and will bring the body with them. The funeral will take place on Sunday. Corporal Macdonald belonged to No. 1 Battery, G. A. He has been a member of the Provincial militia for many years past, and was one of the most experienced members of the team. He was about forty-five years of age, and leaves a widow to mourn her loss. Mr. Macdonald was also a member of the Hook and Ladder Company, and the flag is floating at half-mast from the central station.

Reports of Committees.

BITTER DEBATES ANTICIPATED.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10. In the House of Commons, yesterday, the Government announced that they had decided not to admit, at present, cattle from the United States for slaughter in Canada. This announcement was received with great satisfaction. Considerable progress was made in Committee of Supply. The Senate's Committee have prepared the draft of a report for consideration to-day. It sets forth that out of the hundred thousand dollars steal, fifty-four thousand seven hundred was paid to Mercier and Paucaud for retiring obligations for Mercier, Senator Pelletier, Charles and Francis Langelier, Tarte and Paucaud; and the remaining forty-four thousand seven hundred was drawn by Paucaud, but its application cannot be traced. They declare that the charges made by Langelier against Senator Robitaille are totally unfounded. The sub-committee was unable to agree and have prepared a majority and minority report on the Tarte-McGreery affair. Discussion in the House on the reports will be the bitterest of the session. New and startling revelations may be expected about next week. There is no probability of prorogation before the end of the month.

The Quebec Steal.

A ROYAL COMMISSION

MONTREAL, Sept. 10. It is reported that the difference between Lieut. Governor Angers of Quebec and his cabinet has been settled and that a royal commission composed of Judges Jette, Lorange and Andrews will be appointed immediately to investigate the alleged scandals. Mercier arrived in Montreal last night. He flatly contradicted the report that the Quebec Ministry intends resigning on account of the Bay Chaleur scandal.

A Wonderful Event.

Pregnant With Untold Issues.

LONDON, Sept. 10. The City of New York arrived at Queenstown on Tuesday and yesterday the mails were delivered at the London post office, thus making the journey from Yokohama to London in less than twenty-one days. The post office guide allows thirty-one days by this route, and forty-three days by the Suez Canal. Everyone is talking about the wonderful event. The Times says this record is pregnant with untold issues for the future of the empire.

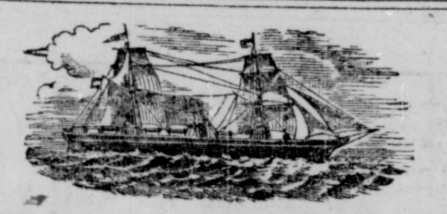
PARIS, Sept. 10. Jules Grevy, former President of the French Republic, is dead.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.) HALIFAX, Sept. 9.—Quebec—Cod fishing reported good at Magpie and St. John, fair at Long Point, Seven Islands, Moisie, St. Marguerite and Paspebiac. Luncheon plentiful at all the above places excepting Magpie and St. John River. P. E. Island.—No change reported. Hake and eel still plentiful, cod and mackerel fair off East Point. Cape Breton—Cod, hake and haddock, fair at Port Hood. Cod fairly plentiful at Ingonish, but only poor catches owing to scarcity of bait. Cod and herring still fair at Arichat.
