Questions In The Legislature

The following questions have been answered in the Legislature: Question—J. W. D. Campbell: Give present yearly salaries of the following: (a) Horticultural Department of Agriculture, (b) Agricultural Representative—Prince County, Queen's County, King's County.
2. (a) How long was Mr. David MacLean employed as successor to Mr. S. C. Wright as Queen's County Representative? (b) How long was Mr. Merlin MacDonald employed as successor to Mr. Harry Robbins as Provincial Poultry Director? (c) Give the qualifications of each of these officials and salaries paid in each case.
3. From whom has the office space for the Prince County Agricultural Representative been rented? (a) Give cost of rental. (b) Give cost of office equipment. (c) Is there a stenographer employed? Give name and salary.
4. At the time of employment what were the qualifications of the two Dairy Inspectors—Messrs. Vessey and Payne—and from whom they receive instructions? (a) Give salaries in each case. (b) Outline duties of these officials.
5. Give names of part time employees working for the Department of Agriculture during the year and salaries in each case.
6. Outline work on Horticulture conducted with farmers during the season. State where such work was carried out.

Answer:
1. (a) \$2,900; (b) \$2,900, \$3,200, \$2,700.
2. (a) Was employed as Student Assistant, not Queen's County Representative, from June 10 to August 31. (b) Was employed as Poultry Fieldman, not Provincial Poultry Director, June 28. Resigned November 20. (c) David MacLean, a graduate of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College. Employed at Vocational School—employed as a Student Assistant at \$150.00 per month—Mr. Merlin MacDonald, a practical poultryman, has been a member of a Junior Poultry Club. Blood tested for Department. From June 28 to September 30 at \$150.00 per month—From October 1 to November 20 at \$166.66 per month.
3. Willard MacDonald, Ltd. (a) \$40.00 per month for office and Board Room. (b) Purchased by the Department of Public Works. (c) Yes. Miss Ruby Best transferred from Department of Education, \$1,200.
4. Both employees have farm background, with Mr. Payne having two years at Prince of Wales College. Were instructed by the Dairy Superintendent and Assistant Dairy Superintendent. (a) Claude Payne \$2,300; Richard Vessey \$2,000. (b) Appointed as Check Testers and Official Butter Weighers. To check test milk and cream at dairy manufacturing plants and officially weigh butter that is tendered to the Dairy Products Board.
5. Blair Kelly, April 27-Sept. 3, \$175.00 per month; Leigh Donald, May 3-July 22, \$175.00 per month; Millicent Mann, May 17-Aug. 31, \$125.00 per month; David MacLean, June 10-Aug. 31, \$150.00 per month; D. C. Schurman, June 17-Dec. 31, \$200.00 per month; Waido Dingwall, Aug. 1-Sept. 8, \$175.00 per month.
6. Spent considerable time with farmers in the Bedouque and Gaspareux areas that were producing horticultural crops for canneries. Visited producers and those connected with the production and distribution of strawberries, blueberries and cranberries, to ascertain the problems presented, and to offer assistance in the promotion of small fruit growing. This included areas in the Eastern section of the Province, and as far west as Tignish. Tree fruit and bush fruit producers also received attention, as well as some work on weed spraying in horticultural crops. Assisted in the inspection of gardens and Achievement Days of the Junior Garden Clubs.

\$5.00 a ton and the bulk price was as low as \$3.40 a ton.
Mr. Bell: "I have a copy of an invoice showing that I paid at the rate of \$5.50 a ton, landed at Hunter River."
Mr. Baker: "That makes no difference what you paid. I am telling you what it could be bought for from at least three different companies. Where did you buy yours?"
Mr. Bell: "From the Snowflake Company in St. John, N. B."
Premier Matheson: "They were using you for a sucker."
Mr. Baker: "In any event, Mr. Speaker, I submit that the price paid by the Opposition leader was less than the \$5.00 mentioned in his speech."

FEDERATION BRIEF

Mr. Baker said he was pleased to note that the Federation of Agriculture, in their brief, had said that the butter kept in the Island Cold Storage plant was in much better shape than that which was sent to the mainland for storage. "We have heard a lot about the milk testing that was carried out by the Department during the past summer," he added.
He noted that the Federation of Agriculture has approved the appointment of these inspectors and made the statement that they would be a great help to both processors and producers.
"I wonder whether the Opposition would like to curtail this service or whether they would oppose this commendation made by the Federation which is the largest farmer's organization in this Province. I think there was plenty of encouragement for the Department to support these men."

CANNING ACTIVITIES

Speaking of the canning plant at Bedouque, Mr. Baker said that it had operated successfully during the past year and that indications pointed to a large extension of their activities in the coming season. A letter from a prominent Halifax resident, read by Mr. Baker indicated dissatisfaction with the amount of gelatin contained in Island canned chicken and turkey and stated that because of this a great many people were turning towards the American products. Mr. Baker said that while this might represent the opinion of only the writer, he felt that it was a matter worthwhile investigating and as a first step he was going to send a copy of the letter to all plants in the Province that are engaged in the canning of these products. "It would be a pity," he said, "to see people deserting the Island product."
The Minister said that the field crops director was back on the job and that he would be able to give assistance to farmers in seeing that a better service is provided in the cleaning facilities for grain and in the control of weeds. He announced that the agricultural engineering program had been mapped out and already the engineer had had several requests for the drawing of plans for buildings Mr. Baker said that this man would be provided with a shop to carry on experiments regarding certain farm machinery particularly with a view to finding an inexpensive type of sprayer for spraying fruit trees. He will work in conjunction with the horticulturists on this project.

OFFICE AT S'SIDE

Mr. Baker said that in response to complaints from West Prince, an agricultural office had been established at Summerside. The office will have a representative and a secretary and will contain a board room where small groups may meet. The cost of obtaining this office, he said was very modest.
The Minister said he was interested in the fishmeal plant at Souris and stated that it could be of tremendous benefit to the farm-ers as a source of protein in livestock diet. He cautioned the committee concerned with the granting of industrial loans and to exercise care so that too many of the same type of industries would not be situated together.
