One Suspect Arrested, Continue Search For 2nd

One of the two men sought by police following a break into two stores in Kensington early Monday morning has been picked up by RCMP.

The suspect was picked up on the Malpeque Road near Summerside as he was hitchhiking, shortly after noon yesterday.

Last night RCMP in Charlottetown said the suspect was under arrest and lodged in the Queens County jail and will appear in court this morning.

They declined to divulge his name or his home address. The search for the second man is continuing.

The search for the two men began early Monday morning when Kensington Town Policeman Vernon Reeves came upon the two after they had broken into two stores in the Prince-County town.

Constable Reeves said he stopped his car to investigate a parked car in front of the general store of Gerald MacKenzie. His suspicions grew when he noticed two men crouched beside the car on the driver's side.

Drawing his nightstick, the unarmed constable advanced on the pair when one made a frenzied attempt to open the car door and reach inside. At that moment the constable said he slammed the door on the man's shoulder which caused him to stagger off balance and drop an object inside the car.

FOILED ATTEMPT

The foiled man then took to his heels and joined his companion who had previously started to run. Inside the car Constable Reeves said he found a loaded shotgun, which he believes the man was reaching for when the door slammed on his arm and shoulder.

The constable then sounded the fire alarm in the town and hurriedly organized a large number of citizens to try to roundup the pair in nearby woods.

The RCMP were also informed and one of the largest man-hunts seen on the Island in many years was on. By late afternoon however the search for the second man was being conducted almost solely by RCMP who were also aided by a trained tracking dog from Moncton.

STOLEN CAR

The car the pair attempted to enter outside the MacKenzie store was discovered to be loaded with merchandise from that store and also from Athol Cotton's store. The car itself is one believed to have been stolen in a series of breaks and thefts from service stations and garages in Montague early Sunday morning.

The pair that are being sought by police are suspected also of a series of breaks into business premises the previous weekend at St. Peters and Morell, and this last weekend at Vernon and Montague.

In the search yesterday morning, Prince Edward Island's flying farmer Elton Woodside also took an active part with his private plane.

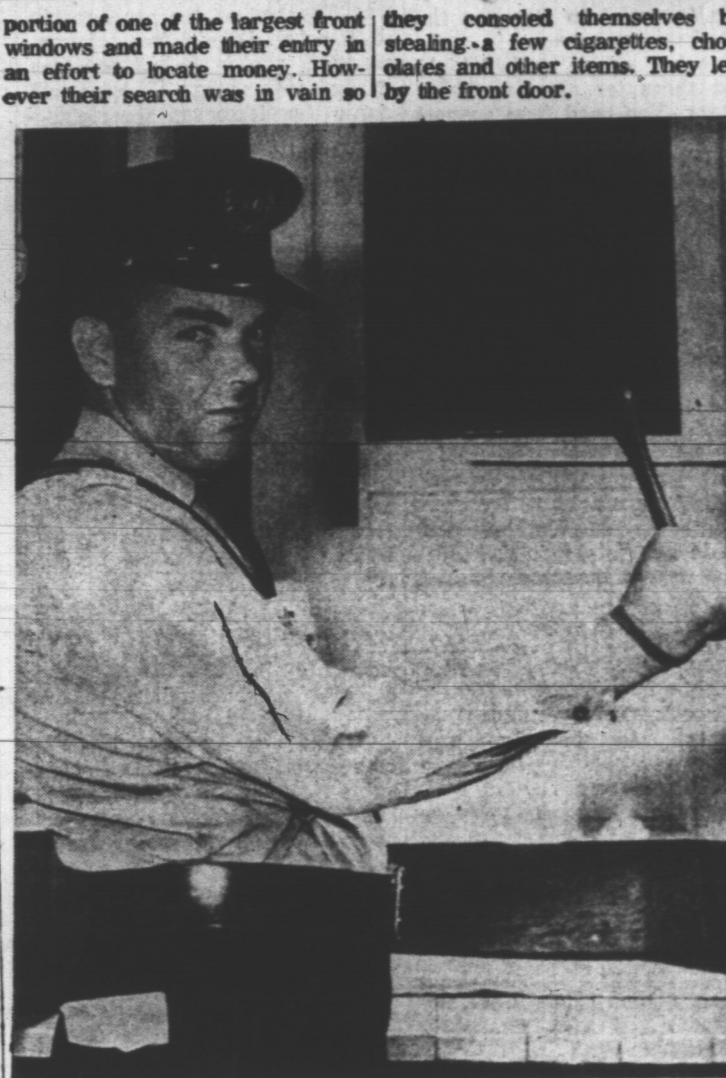
Burial took place in the Trendale Cemetery, Washington, B.C.

Indifference Is Seen In Losers' Behaviour

LOS ANGELES (AP)—If there was any prevailing attitude in the National League dressing room after Monday's all-star game, it was one of pleasant philosophical indifference.

Naturally manager Fred Haney and his troops would have preferred to invert the 5-3 score, but their defeat was hardly a grave enough matter to provoke uncontrollable tear-spilling.

"It was a good game," Haney said, speaking in a quiet, friendly manner. "We just got beat, that's all. We had a couple of chances to score and we missed."

"It's easy to talk about a game when you win."

A newsman noted that three of the Nationals' most formidable long-ball hitters — Hank Aaron, Ernie Banks and Willie Mays — all went without even a single. "Don't make them the goats," Haney said.

Fred was questioned about his strategy in the last of the ninth, when he had two on with none out and catcher Hal Smith of St. Louis coming up against Cleveland's Cal McLish.

Smith, a 279 hitter who can be troublesome, twice tried without success to lay down a bunt, then struck out.

The next two men grounded out and the game was over.

"Is Smith usually a good bunter?" Haney was asked.

"I don't know," Fred said. "He's a major league ballplayer, isn't he?"

Haney had only two men — his own Johnny Logan and Bill Mazeroski of Pittsburgh — to use as pinch hitters in the situation. But this offered no advantage because the pitcher was a right-hander and both Mazeroski and Logan hit right handed, like Smith.

150 Residents Of Baie Verte Are Returned To Their Homes

GRAND FALLS, Nfld. (CP)—The CNR coastal vessel Nonia sailed from here Monday night with 150 people returning to their remote Baie Verte homes saved from a forest fire by rains and favorable winds Saturday.

About 345 people were evacuated from the little community by the Nonia Saturday night. Most of them were children. The remainder of the evacuees will be taken to their homes on a return trip Tuesday.

Officials said Monday the fire which burned valuable spruce and balsam fir timber was out. The acreage burned was not immediately available.

Originally it was planned to evacuate the town's 800 population when it seemed certain it would be destroyed. But by the time the wind shifted and the rains came the Nonia had already left with the evacuees.

The sudden influx of Baie Verte residents kept Red Cross, Salvation Army and other workers busy finding accommodation. Radio appeals brought more offers of housing than was needed.

Maritime Electric Plans New Power Installation

With the installation of a new oil fired boiler and turbo generator at the Maritime Electric Plant in Charlottetown the output of electrical power on the Island is expected to be greatly increased.

With 11 percent more power used by the people of Prince Edward Island in the first seven months of 1959, company officials feel that the proposed additions are a necessity if they are to give the type of service required.

To house the new equipment a boiler room and boiler foundation will be built and a contract for this work has been awarded to M. F. Schurman, Co., Ltd. R. is a part of an overall program which the company started last year, estimated to cost \$1,850,000.

The new building which is to be constructed to the west of the Charlottetown plant will be of steel frame with insulated walls of corrugated asbestos and brick.

BOILER ORDERED

The new No. 5 oil-fired Boiler, with 105,000 lbs per hour steaming capacity has been ordered from Foster-Wheeler Ltd., and is to be in use by September 1st of next year. By the 15th of May, 1961, it is expected that a new No. 3 Turbo-Generator, ordered from C. A. Parsons, Ltd., Newcastle - On - Tyne, England, and capable of producing 10,000 Kilowatts, will be commissioned. Consulting engineers for the extension are the Montreal Engineering Co. Ltd., and resident engineer is Island-born Mr. E. G. Nicolie.

The extension has necessitated the moving of the present 28,000 barrel fuel-oil storage tank to a point East of the C.N.R. main line, and South of Grafton Street. Contract for this work, now under way, was previously awarded to Schurman, and includes installation of 350 crescent-shaped piles covered with reinforced concrete slab to support the tank. Of further interest is the fact that the sky boiler and turbine will be capable of being partially remotely controlled from the new central control room, which is to be included in the extension. Located at this point will be equipment for eventual automation of the Plant, and remote control of the Company's substations throughout the Province.
