**BRITISH PARLIAMENT
OPENS TO-DAY**

**Summary of The Queen's
Speech**

**WAYS AND MEANS WANTED
FOR THE TRANSVAAL WAR.**

The Legislative Programme Will Be Submitted Later.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Oct. 17.—The Queen's speech at the opening of Parliament to-day will declare that Parliament has been summoned at an unusual date for a specific purpose, and that this course has been rendered necessary by two circumstances: First, Her Majesty's proclamation calling out the reserves is necessarily followed by the summoning of Parliament within ten days; and second, the position of affairs in South Africa demands the attention of the Legislature. Her Majesty will then declare that her general relations with foreign powers are peaceful, a state of affairs which unfortunately does not apply to the Transvaal.

The House of Commons will be invited to provide the ways and means necessary to prosecute the British policy in South Africa. The speech will conclude with a promise that when the proper time shall arrive the Legislative programme of the Government regarding matters of international interest will be submitted to the House of Commons.

Go to Columbia**

**SHAMROCK'S TOPMAST BROKEN
TO-DAY**

Hope for Better Luck to-morrow

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—The Columbia beat the Shamrock fully a mile and a half in a ten knot breeze. The weather was foggy and this may have something to do with the challenger's defeat. But the Columbia outfooted and outpointed her opponent from the start to the finish and was quicker in stays.

The Columbia's new sails almost transformed her and she sailed like a new boat.

The Columbia wins by 10 minutes and 14 seconds, actual time, and 10 minutes eight seconds corrected time.

The yachts finished nearly half an hour within the time limit.

The race to-day will be over a triangular course of ten miles to the leg and the Shamrock will have an opportunity to show what she can do on her favorite point of sailing.

THE RACE TO-DAY

Columbia Leads—Shamrock's Topmast Carried Away.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—The yachts have started. The Shamrock got away 10 seconds ahead of the Columbia.

11.14—The Columbia has just passed the Shamrock and is well to the windward of her.

11.15—The Columbia is rapidly drawing away from the Shamrock.

Highlands of Navesink.—It looks as if the Shamrock's topmast has been carried away. She is laying up in the wind.

11.27—The Columbia is on the course.

11.30—The yachts are making for the rippled racer.

Highlands of Navesink.—It appears that the Shamrock's topmast has been carried away. She is lying up in the wind, her topsail is standing down and she has taken in her forestaysail. The wind was about nine miles an hour when the accident occurred. It was apparently caused by her jumping in a heavy sea.

11.26 a. m.—The Columbia has gone on the starboard tack and has hauled down her jib topsail. She continues on the course. It is understood that the Columbia is sailing over the course under an agreement entered into between the owners of the yachts that should either boat be disabled the other is to sail over the course alone.

The Shamrock is preparing to take a tow back. The Shamrock's topmast with her big club topsail was carried away at 11.24.

11.46 a. m.—The Columbia continues on her course and is on the starboard tack, about 5 miles on her first leg. When the yachts were on the port tack, about three miles from the start, the Shamrock luffed into the wind at once and the Columbia kept on according to agreement.

**SITUATION IN
SOUTH AFRICA**

**Nothing Definite From
Mafeking.**

**REPORTED THAT THE BOERS
WERE REPULSED**

Alleged Disloyalty and Rioting in Cape Colony

LONDON, Oct. 17.—The war news is still in the region of surmise.

There are rumors that the Boers have been repulsed at Mafeking and are attacking Vryburg. A Cape Town paper has a despatch from Orange River, stating that the telegraph wires have been cut between Vryburg and Kimberly and that the Boers are taking advantage of the presence of a large gathering of disloyal farmers at Vryburg, celebrating Naetmaal, to attack the town hoping that the farmers will assist them against the British.

The same despatch says that the British force at Kimberly is confident of its ability to hold out, but urges the immediate despatch of a relief force.

This question of the possible rising of farmers in the northern portions of Cape Colony is very important.

The Daily Mail's correspondent at Colesburg has been enquiring regarding the matter, and on the whole thinks the chances are against a rising. Nevertheless there is serious disloyalty and much anti-British agitation in these districts, while the Free State Boers threaten an immediate invasion of Colesburg and All-wal North.

The Daily Mail's correspondent asserts that Sir Alfred Milner is worked to death, and that Capetown is surging with bitter resentment at what is called the Schreiner Cabinet's betrayal of Mafeking by its constant refusal to send a volunteer force to its relief.

On Sunday night the streets were filled with angry citizens. It was feared that rioting would occur, and the volunteers were called out.

FROM MAFEKING.**

**The Boers Repulsed With
Heavy Loss.**

TWO SMALLER ENGAGEMENTS-

Result in Small Losses By the Boers.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

KIMBERLY, October 17.—An armored train, while reconnoitering near Syfontein engaged the Boers, killing five and wounding seven. The British had no losses.

Lorenzo Marques refugees, who have arrived here from the Transvaal, report that the Boers have been repulsed at Mafeking sustaining heavy losses.

Heavy fighting took place this morning north of Mafeking. An armored train, sent to repair the railway line, opened fire on the Boer command. One Burgher was killed and two wounded.

A second engagement followed in which nine British were wounded, then while General Cronje's troops were near the broken railway bridge nine miles north of Mafeking an approaching train loaded with dynamite was fired upon and blown up.
