MacLean Hurls 2-Hitter As Flyers Clip Stars 9-2

Donnie MacLean, big right-hander of the Flyers, tossed brilliant two-hit ball and his mates slammed out nine hits, including five doubles and a home run, to dump the cellar-dwelling Stars 9-2 yesterday at Memorial Field.

MacLean was very nearly un-touchable as he pitched no-hit ball for 6 2/3 innings before Archie MacFadyen broke the spell with a scratch infield single. Bill Purcell got the other hit off Donnie, a towering home run to dump the Stars for good.

The Stars got their other run in the second frame when MacLean got a little wild and walked MacGuigan and Purcell and MacGuigan scored on a pair of wild pitches to tie up the game 1-1.

That was as close as the Stars could get to the heavy hitting airmen all afternoon as Fiddler's boys blasted across four runs in the last half of the third. Farley walked to lead off the third; MacLean popped out to the catcher and Pineau also walked; Jack Burke drove both runs home with a long single and the next batter, Kip Reedy cleared the right field fence with a 350-foot clout to pile up a 5-1 lead for the Flyers.

The winners added three more in the seventh on a pair of walks, a single by MacNeill and Gallant's double.

Halting a downhill slide that threatened to knock them out of the first division, New York Yankees Sunday came through with a 7-3 and 2-0 doubleheader sweep over Kansas City to regain first place from Chicago White Sox in the American League pennant race.

Cleveland Indians also planted both feet firmly into the pennant picture, knocking off Baltimore twice 5-1 and 5-2 to advance to within one game of the top and two percentage points of second-place Chicago White Sox.

The Sox, who led the Yankees by three points Saturday, were held to a split by fourth-place Boston Red Sox, who fell four lengths behind the Yankees. Boston struck back with a 2-1 victory after Billy Pierce had pitched the White Sox to a 4-0 first game triumph.

FORD GAINS 11th
Fine hurling by Whitey Ford and Rookie Johnny Kucks and timely hitting by Mickey Mantle and Yogi Berra combined to end the Yankees' losing ways. Ford gained his 11th victory in the opener when the Yankees exploded for six runs in the fourth against Art Ditmar. Mantle's two-run triple and Berra's single, climaxed the spree. It was a ninth inning double by Mantle and Berra's home run that ended a scoreless pitching duel between Kucks and Arnie Portocarrero in the nightcap.

DETROIT STILL IN
Detroit's fifth place Tigers, still in the running, dropped 7 1/2 games behind when they were held to a split by Washington. After pounding out a 7-3 victory, the Bengals were shut out 3-0 by Washington rookie Ted Abernathy in the nightcap.

The National League picture remained unchanged as the top three teams—Brooklyn, Milwaukee and New York—divided doubleheaders to leave the runaway Dodgers still 13 1/2 games in front of the Braves and 15 ahead of the Giants.

The Dodgers saved Don Newcombe (15-1) from almost certain defeat, coming from behind to defeat the Braves 9-7 in the first game but Milwaukee bounced back to thrash the Braves 9-2 in the nightcap.

The Giants whipped Cincinnati 4-1 after the Reds had ended a seven-game losing streak with a 6-4 first game victory.

Philadelphia's onsurging Phillies took St. Louis Cardinals in camp twice 6-5 and 3-0 for their 14th and 15th victories in the last 16 games. The double win moved the Phils to within a game and a half

Island Hunters Allowed 13 Extra Days This Year

Number 13 is the lucky figure for hunters in Prince Edward Island this year. For that's the number of extra days shooting that is to be allowed in the Island during 1955. The open season on waterfowl has been extended from 57 to 70 days, according to information released today by the Canadian Wildlife Service of the Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources.

Duck hunters on the Island will be allowed a daily bag limit of eight ducks which is the same as provided for in the 1954 season.
