Robin Roberts To Start In All-Star Game Today Against Billy Pierce

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Robin Roberts will start today in the National League All-Star game against Chicago's Billy Pierce, a surprise choice by manager Al Lopez of the American League.

Impressed by the lefthanded batting power on the National team, Lopez selected the 26-year-old pitcher to start. Although his record is 14-11, Pierce is close to his 1953 form when he also started the all-star game against Roberts at Cincinnati. The Nationals won 5-1.

Manager Leo Durocher of the Nationals by passing Don Newcombe, Brooklyn's pitcher-sluggo, to start the game and five home runs by the 28-year-old Philadelphia righthander, owns a 13-7 record. Newcombe will follow Roberts for the middle three-innings with Sam Jones (9-10) of Chicago Cubs finishing.

Under the rules, no pitcher can go more than three innings unless the game goes into extra innings while all the other starters, selected by the votes of 6,562,064 fans, must play at least the first three innings unless injured.

WYNN AND FORD—Lopez expects to bring in Early Wynn (11-4) of his own Cleveland staff to follow Pierce. Whitey Ford of New York Yankees (10-4), the 1954 starter at Cleveland where the Americans won 11-9 to stop a four-game losing streak, is the likely late-inning pitcher.

Tickets priced from \$7.50 to \$1.50 are reported selling at tremendous premiums, some as high as \$50, for baseball-mad Milwaukee is all hopped up about its first all-star game. A sellout crowd of 45,000 will jam County Stadium, contributing receipts of about \$175,000. Rita Lohnes and Miss Driscoll, of Saint John Riverside, carded 86, good enough to give them a virtual monopoly on the leader-ship in the early stages. Mrs. H. P. Connor of Halifax Ashburn, former Maritime and Nova Scotia titlist, was five strokes behind with 91.

The 57 competitors finished the day amid annoying mist that drifted in over the fairways of the Sydney Langan golf club and drove most scores higher than they might otherwise have been.

Miss Driscoll beat Miss Lohnes 41-45 over the first nine holes, chiefly because Rita hit four traps. The Nova Scotian settled down over the second nine to reverse the scores.

Mrs. Graham Day of Truro and Mrs. Tommy Legan of Halifax Ashburn were tied for third place with 97s, a full 11 strokes off the pace.

Miss Driscoll is the only non-Nova Scotian. She is a student at Mount St. Bernard's College at Antigonish.

In the fourth Bell Banks upset long and Jean B. Lee. Premier J. Walter raced the fastest mile of his life in the seventh as he lowered his time to 2:12 3/5.

Terrific Boxing Card On Tap At Forum Tonight

Charlottetown's Centennial will be fittingly celebrated by the "battle of the century" to take place at the Forum tonight. Promoter Ivan Doherty has spared no expense to bring to Charlottetown fans what most fight observers describe as the greatest card ever presented in the history of the city.

Three fighters, hailing from New York are being matched with two local boys and one whom citizens of both Charlottetown and Dartmouth like to claim as their own. Jimmy Skinner, rugged American Negro middleweight, will headline the card in a ten-round main event go with Cobey McCluskey.

Skinner, nicknamed "Tiger" will be meeting another tiger in the person of McCluskey, a one-time fancy-dan who has demonstrated in his last pair of fights that he has forsaken his former cutie tactics for those of the slugger.

In his second last fight McCluskey belted away Willie Pollard at Dartmouth in three rounds and in his last encounter he had Johnny McDonough on the canvas eight times before he salted him away in the eighth round.

Skinner brings with him a record of 17 pro fights, of which he dropped four by decision and won ten by knockouts. While he is a member of Uncle Sam's fighting forces, Jimmy took part in 45 bouts, losing only three by decisions.

In two semi-final bouts Don "Duck" Trainor will tangle with Billy Crawford, and Gaston Roy will be pitted against Artie Chorbak.

Trainor will be making his first appearance in a local ring since his unsuccessful go with Danny Taylor here last summer. Trainor was knocked out in that bout and a scheduled return match between the pair had to be called off when Don came down with a virus infection that sidelined him for almost a month.

In fact Don was suffering from that infection, although he was unaware of it, during his fight with Taylor, and needless to say it sapped his strength considerably, making him an easy victim for the hard hitting Taylor.

New Basketball Rule Is Adopted

TORONTO (CP)—A poll conducted by the Canadian Amateur Basketball Association has resulted in the adoption of a 12-foot wide free throw lane on courts throughout the country.

The decision to increase the width of the free throw lane from six feet to 12 feet was made unanimously by the CABA and is expected to be adopted by all provincial amateur basketball associations.

Officials say the new wider free throw lane will help eliminate the advantage now possessed by the tall player.
