**Information for Electors.**  
 In the order that electors may be posted on the arrangements under the Ballot System of the Dominion, we print again the directions of the law. They are as follows:—

The voter is to vote only for one candidate unless two voters only are to be returned for the Electoral District, in which case he may vote for one or for two candidates as he thinks fit.  
 The voter will go into one of the compartments, and with a pencil these the candidate across or opposite the name or names of the candidate for whom he votes.  
 The voter will then fold the ballot, so as to show a portion of the back only, he will then place it in the envelope, which he will close in the usual way, and deliver to the Deputy Returning Officer, who will place it in the ballot box. The voter will then forthwith quit the polling station.  
 If a voter inadvertently puts a ballot paper or envelope, he can return it to the proper officer, who on being satisfied of the fact will give him another.  
 If the voter votes for more candidates than he is entitled to vote for, or places any mark on the ballot paper or envelope by which it can afterwards be identified, his vote will be void and will not be counted.  
 If the voter takes a ballot paper or envelope out of the polling station, or fraudulently puts a ballot paper into the ballot box, he will be subject to be punished by fine or imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, with or without hard labor.
