

Braves Even Series By Defeating Yankees 7-5

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Eddie Mathews the hitting "goat" of three hitless world series games smashed a two-run homer in the 10th inning Sunday for a 7-5 Milwaukee victory over New York Yankees that squared the world series at two games each.

Mathews' smash sent a throng of 45,804 Braves fans storming into the streets while his Milwaukee mates mobbed him at home plate.

Trailing 4-1 with two out and nobody on base in the ninth the Yankees had bounced back to tie the score on Elston Howard's three-run homer into the left field bleachers.

TENSE TENTH
After the Yankees forged ahead in the top of the 10th on Hank Bauer's triple following an infield single by Tony Kubek the Braves pulled this tangle right out of the Yankee hands.

One of the most exciting series games played in many a year approached its climax when plate umpire Augie Donatelli ruled that Tommy Byrne's first pitch in the 10th had nicked pinch-hitter Nippy Jones. Yogi Berra and Byrne protested in vain.

Manager Casey Stengel whose every appearance brought a storm of boos from the customers waved for Bob Grim to replace the lefthanded Byrne.

Red Schoendienst first to face Grim dropped a sacrifice bunt up the first base line moving pinch runner Felix Mantilla to second with the potential tying run.

SENSATIONAL LOGAN
Johnny Logan whose fielding at shortstop had been nothing short of sensational with 10 assists, then came through with a slashing double to left that scored Mantilla with the tying run.

Grim worked the count on Mathews to 2-2 before the muscular third baseman slammed the ball into the right field bleachers about 350 feet from the plate.

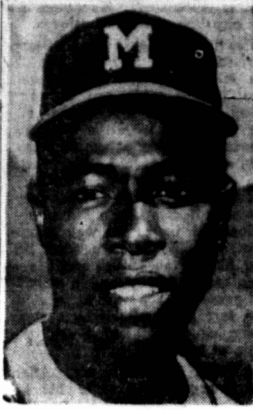
Out from the Braves' dugout came a swarm of jacketed layers to form a receiving line. One by one they wrung the hands of Logan and Mathews as they came striding home with the runs that kept the Braves very much alive.

The series now must return to Yankee stadium for a sixth game Wednesday—and possibly a seventh on Thursday. There will be an off day for travel after today's fifth and final contest at County Stadium.

Whitey Ford the chunky lefty who beat Warren Spahn in the opener will go for the Yankees today against Lew Burdette the winner of the second game.

Spahn was the whole story of this ball game up to the last out of the ninth. Although he went out for a pinch-hitter Jones in the 10th it still was his victory.

Casey Didn't Want Carey To Be Out At The Plate

MILWAUKEE (AP) — A tiny mark of shoe polish on a brand new baseball played a vital role in Sunday's world series game.

As the result of the polish, umpire Augie Donatelli reversed his decision in the 10th inning and ruled that Nippy Jones of the Milwaukee Braves had been hit by a pitched ball.

This put him on first, sent Yankee pitcher Tommy Byrne to the showers, and set in motion the chain of events that was climaxed by Ed Mathews' game-winning homer.

"Yeah, I saw the polish," said Yogi Berra, Yankee catcher, who at first had contended that Jones had not been hit. "The ball must of hit his shoe."

ANOTHER KEY POINT
Manager Casey Stengel of the Yankees verified what Berra said.

Another key point was in the eighth when Andy Carey led off with a double, and advanced only to third—and had to scramble back on his belly to avoid being thrown out — on Jerry Lumpe's pinch single to short center.

Some experts felt Carey should have scored on the single, which would have given the Yankees the game in nine innings when Elston Howard hit his three-run homer in the ninth. As it was

Carey was left stranded when Tony Kubek hit into a double play.

"I didn't know if Carey got a good start when Lumpe hit the ball," said Stengel. "I didn't want him to be thrown out at the plate. We thought we had to hold him at third."

CURVE BALL
Howard, who hit a three-run homer that tied the game with two out in the ninth and the count 2 and 2, was as gum after the game as if he had botched it himself.

Asked what kind of a pitch he sent soaring over the left field fence he said curtly: "It must have been a curve or a fast ball."

Bob Grim, who went to the relief of Byrne in the 10th, said he did not consider walking Johnny Logan after Felix Mantilla, running for Nippy Jones, had advanced to second on Red Schoendienst's sacrifice.

"I was trying to give him some bad balls, but I guess I gave him a good pitch—too good a pitch."

Logan doubled and brought in the tying run.

Stengel said after the game: "We did all right — we came back pretty good, but everybody botched it away. Kubek and Hank Bauer put us ahead in the 10th but we couldn't hold it."

Mathews Had Best Feeling Of His Life After Homer

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (AP)—Slugging Eddie Mathews, who broke his slump and knocked the world series wide open, was the big man in the Milwaukee Braves joyous dressing room Sunday.

"It was a fast ball and I had the best feeling of my life when it left my bat," Mathews said on his 10th inning homer which settled the thrilling fourth game of the series, 7-5 for the Braves.

"I knew the blow had the distance, but I got scared for just a second when I saw Hank Bauer (Yankee right fielder) tapping his hand in his glove, like he had a chance. He didn't. And boy, was I glad."

Mathews in the fourth had doubled for his first hit in 10 series trips. "I wasn't discouraged entering today's game, but I wasn't happy, either," said Mathews.

NEW SERIES
Manager Fred Haney, the mild-mannered Brave skipper, quietly sipped a cup of coffee and agreed with a twinkle in his eye, that "it looks like we got a new series starting."

The Braves were somewhat subdued and most of them headed for the showers when the horde of sports writers were admitted into the dressing room 10 minutes after the game.

Nippy Jones, the pinch-hitter who started the big 10th when all seemed lost for the Braves, explained the black mark on the ball proved he was hit by Tommy Byrne's pitch.

"Yogi Berra started to holler that there was no mark on the ball, but the umpire (Augie Donatelli) grabbed it quickly and there it was," said Jones. "It hit me on the instep."

"What did you say when Elston Howard hit that homer?" Warren Spahn, Braves pitcher, was asked.

"Actually, all I had to say was 'Oh, heaven!' The best way I can describe the pitch was that it was a sinker that turned out to be a stinker. I wanted it low and outside. It went low and inside."

Spahn, asked what he had to say when Mathews belted his game-deciding homer.

"I just shouted: 'Oh, yeah!' said the classy lefty.

Hank Aaron said he waded into a knuckle ball to slam his three-run homer off Tom Sturdivant in the fourth. And Frank Torre said he followed with his first homer ever in County Stadium by connecting with a fast ball.

All-Stars Beat Canadiens 5-3

MONTREAL (CP) — Gordie Howe of Detroit Red Wings and Dean Prentice of New York Rangers supplied third-period goals Saturday night to give the National Hockey League's all-stars a 5-3 win over Montreal Canadiens, Stanley Cup champions.

The 11th annual all-star game, which produced the most sustained action in the final period, drew a crowd of 13,003 and a gross gate of \$33,249.

The crowd was below the record 14,169 set in 1947 at Toronto but the gate returns set a record. Previous high was \$30,386.75 in 1953 at Montreal. Ticket prices were higher this year. Proceeds go to the NHL Players Pension Society.

The all-stars proved better marksmen than Canadiens and goalie Glen Hal of Chicago Black Hawks turned in a better job than Jacques Plante, Montreal's Vezina Trophy winner of last season.

FREDERICTON (CP)—Directors of the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island Golf Association Sunday accepted the invitation of the Edmundston Golf club to hold the Association's major tournament in that City next Summer.

The directors also agreed upon major changes in the Willington Cup Team selection system and named courses for the sectional tournaments to precede the championship play at Edmundston.

The Association President, Ivan Ca Stairs, Bathurst, was chairman of the annual fall meeting which drew directors from all sections of the two provinces.

The major business before the meeting concerned the method of selecting members of the Willington cup team which represents the two provinces in the Inter-Provincial play immediately prior to the Canadian Amateur tournament.

In recent years, one member of the team has been named as a result of play in the sectional tournaments and a regional playoff, the same three players have been named as a result of the association's 72-hole tournament. In the future, two players will be named to the team as a result of the sectional and regional playoffs and the N.B. - P.E.I. champion and runner-up will be the other two team members.

Indications of a growing interest in junior golf throughout the two provinces were contained in a report submitted to the meeting by D.S. Skinner, Saint John, chairman of the junior development program of the association. Mr. Skinner's written report told of steps being taken to promote junior golf and urged the co-operation of all clubs.

Toronto Beats Alouettes Ti-Cats Defeat Riders

Toronto Argonauts started the second half of the 14-game Big Four football schedule Saturday with a 41-31 decision over Montreal Alouettes while Hamilton Tiger-Cats squeaked by Ottawa Rough Riders 17-17.

The action created a three-way first-place tie with Alts. Ticats and Riders each with 10 points, eight more than Argos, with six games to play.

It was Toronto's first victory of the season but left the team with only a faint hope of catching a playoff spot.

REMAIN FIRST
In the ORFU, Sarnia Golden Bears stayed in first place by defeating Kitchener - Waterloo Dutchmen 31-21 and London Lords rolled up a 42-0 victory over the winless Toronto Balmy Beaches.

The Beaches have lost nine league games in which they have had 424 points scored against them and have scored a mere 23 points against opposition.

Senior Intercollegiate action opened Saturday with a victory of Western Ontario Mustangs crushing McGill Redmen 26-7 and University of Toronto Blues scoring a 16-8 win over the defending champion Queen's Golden Gaels.

LOT OF JUGGLING
The Argo victory took an airlift of 44 Americans, wholesale cuts and a tremendous amount of juggling to accomplish, but the group now appears to be a well-knit team.

Freddie Wyant, left-handed quarter picked up from New York Giants by Argos 10 days ago, directed traffic as the club barged over for six touchdowns.

He tossed touchdowns passes to

Pete O'Garro and Menan Schriever and bulled over from one yard out for another. Dick Shatto, a powerhouse on both offence and defence galloped through a big hole in the Montreal line for a touchdown and passed to Schriever on another. Davey West accounted for the sixth touchdown on a five-yard plunge. Bart Moll booted five converts.

DEAN OF LINES SCORING
Quarter Sam Etcheverry of the Alts, who completed 22 of 37 yards tossed touchdown passes to Red O'Quinn, Joey Pal and Pat Abbruzzi. Harold Patterson scored the Alts' other touchdown. Bill Beweley kicked the converts and Bob Dean opened the Montreal scoring in the second quarter with a 41-yard field goal.

The Alts moved the yardsticks 28 times against 23 for Toronto. They gained 326 yards through the air on 24 completions in 41 pass attempts against 198 for Argonauts on nine completions of 21 attempts. Argonauts gained 208 yards on the ground against 163 for Montreal.

Tiger-Cats, who held Riders in their own half of the field for most of three quarters, were leading 18-3 early in the final period when the Ottawa offence came to life with two touchdowns.

On the last play of the game, Ottawa's Gary Schriever was slightly short and wide on a 30-yard field goal attempt. The try was good for only a single as Ros Howell conceded the point.

Schriever also kicked a field goal and convert.

Tiger-Cats too: a 6-0 lead in the first quarter on a 10-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Bernie Faloney to end Paul Dekker. Schriever and Hamilton's Steve

Oneschuk traded field goals in the second quarter to give Ticats a 93 halftime lead.

OTTAWA FUMBLES
Hamilton made it 11-3 in the third quarter on two attempted down pass but could find no open receivers. Schriever converted.

With three minutes to go Bobby Simpson caught Dimitroff's 25-yard pass on the Hamilton 25 and ran all the way for an unconverted touchdown.

Gerry McDougall, Eddy Macon and Cookie Gilchrist shared the majority of Hamilton's 265 yards rushed on the ground, Ottawa rushers could net only 84 yards rushing, but gained 267 yards passing to Hamilton's 138.

Ottawa, completed 14 of 28 pass attempts while Ticats were successful 11 times out of 21 attempts. Tiger-Cats advanced through 24 first downs to Riders' 17.

Edmonton Eskimos and Calgary Stampeders swamped the opposition Saturday to retain first and fourth places respectively in the Western Interprovincial Football Union.

Stampeders rolled to an unofficial WIFU yards-gained record with a total of 553 yards against the Saskatchewan Roughriders for a 29-9 win, before 8,500 chills fans in Calgary.

And in Edmonton, The Eskimos kept the Bombers from crossing their 50 yard line even once for a 41-0 win. The second-place Bombers, upset winners 28-27 over Eskimos last Monday at Winnipeg, folded under the tremendous power of the Edmonton line.

STRONG ON GROUND
The 24-degree weather and a slightly slipper field didn't ham-
