

Islanders Score 4-3 Win Over Millionaires In New Glasgow Game

NEW GLASGOW, Dec. 10 (CP)—Charlottetown Islanders started in their bid to overhaul Sydney for second place in the Maritime Major Hockey League Tuesday night, crept within two points of the financially-worried Millionaires by posting a 4-3 victory over the Mills here tonight before 1,940 spectators.

Mills sparked by the brilliant goaltending of colorful Nick Pidsodny who kicked out 31 drives, most of them from close in, staged a spirited drive which produced three goals in the third period, just one short of creating a tie.

Islanders scored singles in the first and second periods, and added another pair in the final canto, while Mills were beating Millar three times. The Sydney club was handled by Whip Whalen, who took over the coaching reins temporarily due to the resignation of Cliff Roach.

Islanders carried the play to Mills in all three periods with the exception of the latter minutes of the final frame.

Dunc McIntyre was serving an elbowing penalty in the opener when Buck Whitlock, league scoring leader, rebounded after Pidsodny had come up with a sensational save. Gordon potted the only goal of the middle chapter unassisted.

Millionaires turned on the pressure in the third period after Marcel Clements had shot Islanders into a three-goal lead at 3:35. Fred Hildebrand broke the ice for Sydney, beating Millar from close in at 4:13.

Then Sydney started to roll. After Joe Wiseman scored what proved to be the winning goal, Reg Campbell and Eddie Marneau beat Millar in quick succession. Marneau, along with Pidsodny shared starring honors for the efforts.

Buck Whitlock leader in the individual scoring race, led the winners with a goal and assist. It was a clean game, with referee Charlie Goode handing out seven penalties.

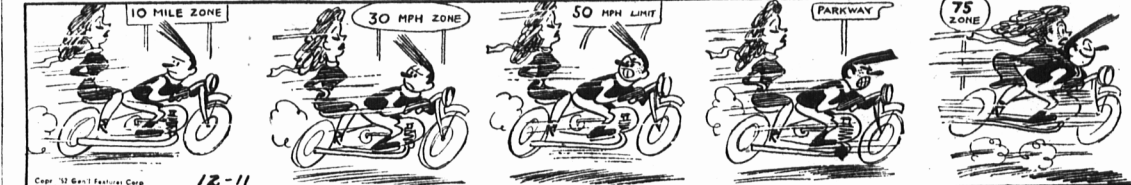

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Successful School For Hockey Referees, Coaches Concluded Last Night

A Physical Fitness Department followed by films on the 1951 N.H.L. all-star game and last spring's Stanley Cup play-offs brought the hockey coaches' and referees' school to an end last night after more than two days of instructions and demonstrations.

With Brigadier Bill Reid presiding over the dinner held at the Charlottetown, presentations were made to the school's chief instructor, George Hayes, and to his assistants Johnny Squarebriggs and Hickey Nicholson.

Judge Hudson, president of the Maritime Major Hockey League, and Walter Lawlor, president of the Maritime Major Hockey Association spoke briefly. Messrs. Hayes, Nicholson and Squarebriggs also made short addresses.

And as they did the day before the students attending the school heard hours of instructions on the fundamentals of playing hockey and on the rules of the game. Johnny Squarebriggs presided over the morning session with a two hour talk on offensive team play. Hickey Nicholson took over in the afternoon with another two hours on the defensive elements of hockey.

Following Nicholson's talk the students saw an interesting film, "Hockey Cavalcade", depicting the development of hockey players and showing scenes of games in the Maple Leaf Gardens and Montreal Forum.

This was followed by a bull session on hockey with George Hayes supplying the answers to questions asked by the candidates.

Walter Lawlor tendered his congratulations to the three instructors and briefly touched upon a number of points brought up during the school regarding coaching and refereeing duties. Judge Hudson stated that he felt the school was a tremendous success. "You not only teach the boys how to referee and how to coach but you also teach them citizenship," he told the instructors. He expressed his appreciation of the work of the teachers and he congratulated Brigadier Reid and the Physical Fitness Department for sponsoring the school.

5-Man Baseball Committee Formed
