A CONTEMPERAT AT BATHURST.—A Bathurst despatch to the Transcript says that yesterday morning on the arrival of the accommodation from Campbellton, an altercation took place between Mr. Geo. P. Jardine, of Moncton, and C. Bruce Macdougall, editor of the Restigouche Pioneer. During the altercation, which was caused by the Pioneer's attack upon Messrs. Lea and Jardine's work on the new I. C. R. tanks, blows are said to have been struck. The matter is likely to be taken into a Justice's court, as Mr. Macdougall has sworn out before Justice McLaughlan a warrant against Mr. Jardine.

WANT A SHIPMENT OF WIVES.—The Acting Mayor of Montreal has received a letter from a woe-begone bachelor in Bisbee, Arizona, who says he writes for himself and a number of other miners there. The letter states that the miners earn good pay, have usually from \$1,000 to \$5,000 each in the bank, and that all these disconsolate and desolate Adams need is an Eve apiece to make their wilderness blossom. Young girls with matrimonial tendencies between 14 and 20, so the letter says, would find good situations as wives, and the miners moreover are quite ready to send money for their fare. The Acting Mayor of Montreal, hardly knowing whether to take the letter in jest or earnest, has instructed the City Clerk to reply that he is not the head of a matrimonial agency, and does not feel like "organizing a society for the furnishing of wives to disconsolate miners."

OTTAWA, Sept. 5. The Provincial Match to-day resulted as follows:—1st, Nova Scotia, \$100, score 662; 2nd, Quebec, \$80, score 644; 3rd, Ontario, score 643; 4th, New Brunswick, score 637; 5th, Manitoba, score 604; 6th, Prince Edward Island, 575. There is not a P. E. Islander in the first 30 from which the Bisley team is selected.

Appointment Confirmed. NANTUCKET, Mass., Sept. 5. At a meeting of the Governor and Council last evening, the nomination of Hon. W. A. Field for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Massachusetts was unanimously confirmed.

Ottawa Notes. OTTAWA, Sept. 5. Application has been made for the incorporation of the Barclay-Clements company (limited), for the purpose of carrying on a general commission, shipping and brokerage business, with headquarters at Yarmouth, and a capital of \$50,000.

The net debt of Canada decreased a million and a half during the past month. Completed returns for the fiscal year ended June 30th show a surplus of four millions, being more than a million better than estimated. The returns of the first two months of the present fiscal year show a surplus of two and a quarter millions. Supt. Wilnot has just returned from British Columbia. He says that the salmon catch in that Province is quite equal to last year. The canneries will turn out at least 400,000 cases, or about 20,000,000 cans.

More Gold in Nova Scotia.

HALIFAX, Sept. 5. At Montague Mines, eight miles from this city on a property owned by Oland & Co., a new lead of gold has been struck. The samples shown would give about 50 ounces to the ton. What has been taken up so far will average from 12 to 15 ounces.

The Sleeping Girl.

MONCTON, Sept. 5. The girl Edora Simpson is still sleeping, and is now in the thirteenth day of her sleep, but the doctors think she may yet awake and recover.

An International Question.

CHICAGO, Sept. 5. An international question is to be presented by the Captain of the Canadian schr. Sligo, whose crew of non-union men were induced to leave the vessel by a committee of the Seamen's Union, the Captain charging that the union interfere with the rights of Canadian fishermen. The vessel is lying at the wharf with no crew.

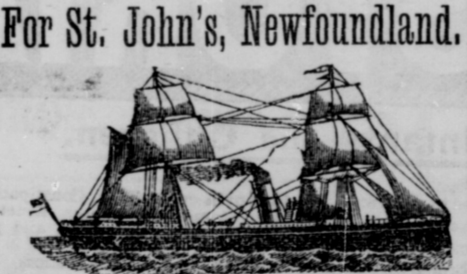
