THE three-story brick building lately erected for Messrs. Dodd & Rogers on Queen Street may be classed as one of the best in the city. Its size is 48x90 and 60 feet high. The outside is supported by iron columns made at the foundry of Messrs. McKinnon & McLean, and the inside supports by Messrs. A. White & Son. The front of the building is heavily trimmed with Nova Scotia freestone and brown stone, which gives it a very pretty appearance. A heavy parapet wall, coped with freestone runs round three sides, which is mainly intended as a fire break. The ceiling is an excellent one, a substantial stone wall 7 feet high running round it, and the floor composed of concrete eight inches deep. Mr. Philip Coyle, jr., had the contract for the brick and stone work, and it is unnecessary to state he performed it satisfactorily and creditably, as did also Messrs. Lowe Bros., contractors for the wood work. The architects were Messrs. Phillips and Chappell, who also superintended the work. The greater portion of this building will, we understand, be used by Messrs. Dodd & Rogers as a wholesale store.

DEATH OF FELIX WALKER, ESQ., M. D. The many friends of Dr. Felix Walker will learn with deep regret of his rather sudden death, which happened yesterday morning, at his place of residence, Cardigan Bridge. Dr. Walker, who had been very much occupied of late with professional work, and as a consequence almost day and night on the road, contracted, some few days ago, a severe cold, which, aggravated by subsequent exposure, developed a severe case of pneumonia. During his last hours he was surrounded by Drs. Conroy, Walsh, Gillis, McLaren and McIntyre, who did all they could to stay the cruel hand of death, but without avail, and he passed quietly away, yesterday.

Dr. Walker was a son of Donald Walker, of Launching Place, a brother of the Rev. Dr. Walker, pastor of Rollo Bay parish and a nephew of the late Hon. Patrick Walker. Some three or four years ago he graduated with the highest honors at McGill University, Montreal, received the degree of M. D., and returning to the Island established himself at Cardigan Bridge, where he was in the enjoyment of a good practice. Dr. Walker, although young in his profession, stood high as a medical practitioner. He was eminently successful in the treatment of difficult cases, his opinion and decisions being always respected and upheld by the Medical Faculty. The grief which the announcement of his death caused the people amongst whom he lived and worked was a sufficient indication of the place he occupied in their esteem and affection. In Dr. Walker's death King's County has lost a most estimable and promising citizen. To his family and friends we extend our sincere sympathies.

In Gloucester the Grit candidates have retired. This has sadly demoralized the Grits. Speaking at Annapolis, Attorney-General Langley admitted that the Government would be sustained, but pleaded for the election of Ray, on the ground that a good Opposition was needed. In Digby, Shelburne, Baddeck and Dorchester, the Grits have substituted ruffianism for argument, without convincing the electors of the righteousness of their cause. In Queen's, Mack, the Grit candidate, made a brutal attack upon Lady Macdonald. He charged her with selling her honor and with wearing the price of her shame around her neck. This is not the first time the Grits have assailed Lady Macdonald, and Mack's ruffianism has disgusted even his own friends.

Meeting at Mount Stewart.

Liberal - Conservative Gains.

MOUNT STEWART, Feb. 16.

A large and enthusiastic meeting was held in the Mount Stewart Hall last night. William J. Logan, Esq., occupied the chair. John S. McDonald, Esq., delivered an excellent address on the public questions of the day. He made a very favorable impression and was loudly cheered. W. S. Stewart, Esq., fairly carried the meeting by storm. He was repeatedly applauded and cheered. E. J. Hodgson, Esq., followed by giving a ringing and eloquent speech. The meeting concluded amid loud cheers for the candidates. Every man is determined to do his best to make the victory of Messrs. Ferguson and Campbell complete. A vote of thanks to the gentlemen who addressed the meeting passed unanimously, which was duly acknowledged by E. J. Hodgson.

The Grits held a meeting in a small room in the basement. The interest became so dull from listening to Mr. Warburton's confused and mixed array of figures, and a series of readings by Mr. Harris, from a wonderful scrap book, that the whole thing fizzled. The Grits became disgusted with the exponents of their policy, and many of them joined the Conservative meeting, determined to vote on election day for the cause of law and order.

SOUBIS, Feb. 16.

A large meeting was held at Bear River last evening. Jas. Keefe, Esq., occupied the chair. The administration of Sir John A. Macdonald's Government was defended in an able speech by John McLean, Esq., M. P. P. The Liberal Conservatives will take three votes to the one they got in 1882 at this polling place.

A victory for Macdonald and Muttart is sure. Currie got his speech off but it was very stale.

Elected by Acclamation.

Grits Backing Down.

CONTEMPTIBLE GRIT TACTICS.

Another Victory Certain.

HALIFAX, Feb. 16.

The nominations yesterday in some places were very exciting. Only one Grit, Mr. Scriver, of Huntingdon, was elected by acclamation.

Five Government supporters were returned unopposed, viz: Dupont, Bagot, Cousol, Montreal East; Meara, Yale, B. C.; Ross, Lisgar; and Giguil, Rouville.

The Grits have also abandoned King's and Gloucester, N. B., and Centre Toronto, one seat in Picton, where only Conservatives are running, and the Grits are running a disqualified candidate in Prince Edward Island.

The Government thus starts with a gain of eleven seats. In many other counties, such as Frontenac, Sherbrooke, Carleton, North Hastings, South Simcoe and Ottawa County dummy Grit candidates were placed in the field at the last moment, in order to save Mr. Blake from the additional humiliation of absolutely abandoning these seats to the Government. The wave of race and revenge, and prejudice, is subsiding in Quebec, and the Government will have at least fifteen of a majority there.

In Ontario the prospects are most cheerful. The Grits are only running one candidate for three Toronto seats, and the Conservatives are confident of redeeming North York, East York, East Simcoe, North Ontario, South Ontario, Peel, West Huron, Bothwell, East Bruce, South Huron and Kingston, while West Lake Superior will return solid Government delegation.
