A COUPLE of weeks ago a mission under the auspices of the Anglican Church was conducted in Ottawa by a band of mission brothers. The services excited a great deal of attention and were very largely attended. One result was seen a few days ago. The Commissioner of Customs received through the hands of Rev. Mr. Bogart, of Ottawa, who was acting for Rev. Mr. Ford, of Brockville, who conducted the mission in St. Alban's church, the sum of \$51.50. It was conscience money, an act of restitution by a person who had defrauded the Government, and who had been made to realize his moral wrong by attending the mission service.

In the Pictorial World, received at the Reading Room last evening, there is a full page engraving of a drawing by Mr. R. Harris, R. C. A., entitled "The Widow's Warning." Commenting upon the picture, the Pictorial World says:—"The Widow's Warning" is the title given by the artist to our principal illustration, and the picture tells its own story. She who in the by-gone years lost her husband in the treacherous sea, now warning her who is on the threshold of life of the danger she incurs of a like irreparable loss and life-long sorrow. We see in the faces of the two young people that the warning does not seem to be heeded. She will not be dissuaded from linking her fate to his; better to spend half her life mourning bitterly for her loss, than lose the happiness of that half of which their mutual love contains the promise."

MR. JOHN LONGWORTH, son of Henry Longworth, Esq., High Sheriff of Queen's County, who left here for the Northwest several years ago, has, we are pleased to learn, been eminently successful. For four years past he has discharged the duties of chief clerk in the C. P. R. freight house at Emerson to the satisfaction of all. As a result of his exemplary conduct, he has been promoted to the important position of station agent for the C. P. R. at Portage la Prairie. On the eve of his departure for the latter place he was banquetted at the Russell. About fifty guests were present, Mayor Irwin presided, and the affair was one of the most successful ever held in Emerson. The toast "Our Guest," was accompanied by a verbal address, in which a warm tribute was paid to Mr. Longworth's worth and character; the information was also volunteered that the guest was to be presented with a gold locket and chain, which would be forwarded to him at Portage la Prairie. Mr. Longworth, in reply, thanked all present for their kindness, and expressed his regret at leaving his many friends at Emerson. The Adams Express Robbery.

CHICAGO, Dec. 27. Complete details of the chase after the Adams Express robbers, who robbed a safe on the St. Louis and San Francisco road on Oct. 25 of \$60,000, were related by Pinkerton officials to-night. The agency has succeeded in arresting five men, one of whom, Fred Witrock, is the author of the "Jim Cummings" letters, and who is claimed to be the man who perpetrated the robbery. The detectives have found about \$15,000 of the stolen booty. The story of the chase has all the dash of a romance.

Grand Larceny.

NEW YORK, Dec. 27. W. K. Souther, formerly of the banking firm of W. K. Souther & Co., which failed in 1885 with heavy liabilities, has been indicted by the grand jury for grand larceny. He is accused of misappropriating the estate of his grandfather, who died in 1873. It is asserted that the accused has applied \$180,000 of the estate to his business.

Storms in England.

NEW YORK, Dec. 24. A cable despatch says the snow storm yesterday in England appears to have done an unprecedented amount of damage to telegraph wires. The snow was attended with hurricanes on the southern and eastern coast. There was much damage to life and property.

Gored by a Bull.

MITCHELL, Ont., Dec. 27. Saturday afternoon, John Dawson, living on the outskirts of the town, was gored to death by a ferocious bull, and his wife, running out to the barn-yard and seeing the bleeding form of her husband, fell dead. They leave a large, grown-up family.

A Halifax Failure.

HALIFAX, Dec. 27. Mackintosh & Co., wholesale grocers, have assigned, creditors to the amount of \$80,000 are preferred. The estate will probably pay 40 cents on the dollar.

Theatre Burned Down.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Dec. 27. The Temple theatre was burned to-day, and the roof fell in, burying two firemen who were burned to death. Loss \$400,000.

A \$2,000 Burglary.

HAMILTON, Ont., Dec. 27. The ticket office of the Grand Trunk station was burglarized early this morning, and over \$2,000 in cash stolen.

Fell off a Bridge.

KINGSTON, Ont., Dec. 27. R. Thompson, a laborer, fell off a bridge at High Falls, and received injuries which resulted in his death.
