EVANS, of Halifax, the ex-champion fancy rifle shot of the world, is stopping at the Hotel Davies. Mr. Evans has lately returned from the States after fourteen years travel with the leading companies. Mr. Evans intends opening up a first-class shooting gallery shortly. MOST LABEL CANNED GOODS.—A bill has been introduced in the Dominion Parliament by the Minister of Trade and Commerce, providing that after July 1st every canner of goods must label the product with the name of the firm by whom it was packed. The informer will be given part of the fine. MORE RECORD SMASHING.—A. A. Bartlett, Charles Weeks and Captain Weeks stand from Charlottetown to Mount Stewart in one hour and seventeen minutes this morning, without the assistance of the wind. They did not need the aid of the train to bring them back; they skated their return trip, arriving in the city at 11:45. FATAL FIRE.—One day last week two children of Aylford Ayles, of Coverdale, near Salisbury, N. B., went out into a field near their father's house and set fire to the stubble. In trying to extinguish the blaze the clothing of the younger child, three years old, caught on fire, and in a short time he was enveloped in flames. His burns were so severe that he lived only a few hours. IMMIGRANTS COMING.—According to advices received by the I. C. R. passenger department, over 2,000 immigrants are now on their way to Halifax. Following are the steamers and the number carried by each: Vancouver, from Liverpool, 62 cabin, 138 intermediate and 830 steerage, total 1030; Lake Superior, 470; Buenos Ayres from Glasgow, 630, including 130 boys; Baunwall from Antwerp, 400. The four steamers combined have 2,490 on board. THE MAILS.—The boats crossed both ways at the Cape to-day, the mail reaching the city about one o'clock. The mails will be transferred to the Stanley Wednesday. The special train will leave here for Georgetown on Tu a y evening (and each evening thereafter) at nine o'clock, and will remain in Georgetown until the steamer returns from Picton. This will be the rule until further notice. The mail closes half an hour earlier than the train leaves each evening. A correspondent travelling in Ulster writes that preparations have gone so far, nothing can prevent the Home Rule bill being passed. He says that despite the denials of Secretaries Moyle, the military authorities are seeking barracks accommodations in Belfast for a considerable body of troops. The guarantee fund levied for the war chest of Ulster is swelled daily by large contributions. The total subscribed already exceeds a million pounds.

Letter From Dr. Macneill.

SIR,—Your last issue of the 23rd inst. is before me. The people are not concerned whether I am poor or rich. I have, therefore, no objection to answer "One who was benefited by Indian Oil," provided he will benefit over his true signature. But in the meantime, as this is a question which deeply concerns the people, it is of great importance to them to know what they are taking. Your correspondent is doubtless a person who glories in the sale of "Kickapoo Indian Oil," and the benefit is down in his pocket, and I very much doubt his sincerity. The public will soon appreciate his motives, and if I can be the means of rescuing the unwary and unfortunate from the unprincipled hands of quacks, charlatans, empirics, and vendors of poisonous patent medicines, I shall be sufficiently rewarded, as they ruin thousands annually. A great many of these preparations are diabolical concoctions. Apart from the crime of obtaining money under false pretences, and ingenious wholesale robbery, it is a devilish scheme for undermining the mind, soul and life of its victims, and this under the pious pretence of strengthening the body and restoring the jaded mind. A great many ignorant people imagine that medical men are injured by these nostrums—hence their opposition to this quackery and all secret nostrums. This idea is wrong. Medical men have a sense of honor and are free to advise the people concerning what has a tendency to injure their health. They are safer guides than the Indian advocate or apothecary, who accepts no responsibility as "his brother's keeper." It is a serious question for the people. The increase in lunacy may well cause reflecting minds to consider if these vile concoctions of alcohol, morphia and other deleterious drugs have anything to do to increase the burdens of the taxpayers in providing accommodations at Falconwood for its victims. One word in the matter of tinctures, and I say this for the public benefit. Medicines are most conveniently administered in tinctures, as the proportion of alcohol in which they are dissolved is insufficient to produce an appreciable effect. Intelligent medical men employ tinctures cautiously where large doses are given, lest the menstruum should counterbalance the beneficial operation of the medicine. Dr. Gould, of Philadelphia, says: "The patent medicine men have got every druggist and every news paper in America in their determined grip. Medical men, in their last resort of such low cunning, and in their intense pre-occupation with disease and its cure, never raise a finger toward meeting such a sneak—never pass a resolution to set legislators right—never try to instruct the people or public in its medical duties and self-interest. If, as a profession, we did but devote a tenth of our collective energy and intellect to these things, quackery would disappear. The medical profession is about wretched itself. It has no means or machinery for reaching the public ear. The few thousand quacks occupy the field; the public hears from them always and emphatically."

The physicians of the civilized world are to-day working for the public welfare, with a zeal and intelligence combined with an unselfishness that no other profession, trade or calling can faintly rival. Think first that these are almost furiously seeking by hygienic and prophylactic to render their own calling useless and superfluous—themselves occupying none. "No physician ever patents or keeps secret any patent or invention. Compare that with the world's way," says Dr. Gould. Mr. Editor, it is not a huge joke, but it is your health, your life, your future, and the public should not trifle with it. It is not unreasonable to require the vendors to take out license, to file the formula under oath with the Government. The British Government once, owing to an absurd and enthusiastic outcry as to the merits of a well known nostrum called Stephen's Specific, was induced to vote £5,000 for its purchase, but after its publication no one could be found foolish enough to use it. With these remarks I hope your nameless correspondent will be satisfied. If not, all he has to do is to come out of his "Indian" hiding place, appear over his true signature, and if he respectfully submits arguments I shall be happy to reply; otherwise he shall receive no notice from yours truly, R. 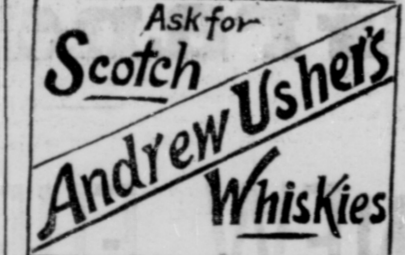

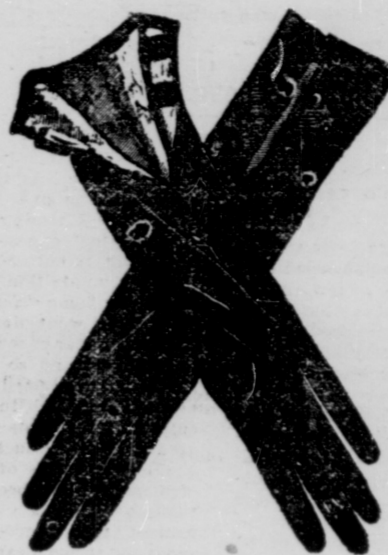
