

Saints Win Out Miss Title

Saint Dunstan's University edged Mount Allison Hawks 64-62 in the second game of a home and home total-goal N.B. — P.E.I. Interscholastic basketball playoff series at S.D.U. gym Saturday afternoon.

Although losing to the local college team, the Mount A. squad still copped the N.B. — P.E.I. crown and now meet the Nova Scotia winner for the Maritime title.

Loss in January the Saints lost to the New Brunswickers by a total of 79-65 at Sackville. Saturday they needed to win by a margin of at least fifteen points and in the first quarter it seemed as if they would do just that opening a ten-point gap early in the game. However in the second quarter the Gus MacFralane-coached five reversed their strategy and got down to business narrowing the margin to within one point. At half time the scoreboard read 29-26 for the Saints.

Both teams ran neck-and-neck in the final session with the lead never being more than eight points for either squad. Saints chalked up a lot of misses, rimming the basket time and time again. The Hawks seemed slightly steadier as the game wore on.

At the foul line the S.D.U. five were more effective than their N.B. opponents. Out of 35 free throws they came through with 24. Mount 'A', on the other hand, completed half of their free tosses making 14 out of 28.

Herb Mays, a Barry, Ontario product, was top marksman of the game, picking up 21 points for the Hawks. With less than a second remaining and the Mount A. squad trailing by four points, Mays, in a final effort, arched a long shot from about thirty feet out. Just as the ball left his hands the final whistle blew but the shot was good and thus the game ended with the score leading by only two points.

Lorne MacGuigan and Gerry Tingley were top scorers for the Saints, each with 19 points. Second highest point-getter for Mount 'A' was MacKay with 17 points.

SUMMERSIDE ACES delighted about 1200 folks Friday night at Civic Stadium when they took a 2-1 decision from Charlottetown Royals in the first game of the best-of-seven set for the intermediate crown—MAHA style—of Prince Edward Island.

Aces refused to let the star-studded line-up of the visitors awe them. They figured they at least belonged on the same ice with Royals and they were certainly right in their figuring. The westerners gave it the old try all evening and their effort was good enough to get them out in front in the big series.

BUT RIGHT HERE and now, we want to say that this fellow Ronnie MacArthur really stole the show for the Steelemen. Ronnie was late in getting into action and the Aces' defence without him was really sad. The team just seemed to lack a leader and had it not been for a sensational Thane Mann in the Summerside cage, the Aces would have been behind in good style. But Thane apparently knew Ronnie was on the way and, knowing that, he decided to keep the westerners in the battle until MacArthur could rally them around him.

It's a long time since we saw a player make such a difference to a club. But Ronnie was the spark the Aces needed and he really put fire in his companions. As well as playing a standout game on defence, he fired the rally in the second period that got Aces back on even footing with the boys from Charlottetown.

YES, WE ARE CONVINCED that MacArthur's arrival mid-way through the first period saved the night for Windy Steady and company. Frizzell, Whitlock and company should have arranged to have the hard working Ronnie stay at his photography instead of rushing down to Civic Stadium. Had they been able to keep him busy in downtown Summerside, Royals would have most likely headed back to the capital early Saturday morning with a big win under their belts.

However, it didn't turn out that way and Aces, pre-series underdogs, are off on top. Next action is at the Sports Arena Tuesday night, with the third game also in Charlottetown on Thursday night.

WE WOULD LIKE to correct a misunderstanding that we know exists in the minds of some Summerside fans. That point is in regard to referees.

The Maritime Amateur Hockey Association only steps in and appoints referees if the competing teams cannot agree. In the case of Friday's game, this wasn't necessary.

Your columnist, acting as the MAHA representative in this province, contacted Royals and Aces to see if they could agree on referees. Royals suggested Maurice Goodwin as their choice and Aces countered with the name of Frank Steele. Both sides seemed delighted with the choices. There was perfect harmony and yours truly was not called upon to name referees. Aces' other choices after Steele, were Faulkner from the air base and Joe Bernard of Summerside. Both these officials were acceptable to Charlottetown. But the opening game officials were Steele and Goodwin. Both teams agreed on that Wednesday night.

We arrived at Civic Stadium Friday night just as the game was getting underway and you can imagine our surprise when we saw two Charlottetown referees out there. We couldn't find out for quite a spell what had happened to the Summerside official but Aces' manager, Layton Schurman, finally let us in on what had happened.

LATE FRIDAY AFTERNOON, Schurman found out that Steele couldn't officiate that evening. Joe Bernard was out of the province and Faulkner had some commitments that he couldn't pass up. Layton was in a spot for a referee. He got on the phone and asked Walter Lawlor to come along and work the game with Goodwin. So Lawlor agreed and that was that.

We heard many folks wondering why two Charlottetown referees handled that Friday game. To put these good fans straight, we have given this explanation.

The Maritime Amateur Hockey Association had nothing whatever to do with the selection. Royals selected Goodwin and Aces chose Lawlor.

These are the facts about Friday's officials.

AND WHILE ON the subject of officials, we think that rink managers should see to it that referees are not annoyed while in their room during periods. The book definitely states that the officials are to be left alone and intruders are to be ordered out by the referees. However, most of the boys who do our refereeing in these parts are not the officious type and certainly don't enjoy ordering folks out. They shouldn't have to, because these folks should never get in.

Sometimes, we find that some folks, with some little chore to do around the rink, feel they have every right to go wherever they like. We don't care if they want to hang on the rafters or tap dance at centre ice during periods. Let them do it. But keep them and their second guessing out of the officials' room.

We intend to see that it's done the rest of the season.

WE ARE OF THE opinion that this present Summerside-Charlottetown series will catch the fancy of many fans before a champion is crowned. Charlie Hogan, Civic Stadium manager, was well pleased with the 1200 attendance Friday and Charlie wasn't hesitant in predicting it would increase greatly as the series goes along.

Here in Charlottetown, the first test is Tuesday night and we have the feeling that at least as many as were in Civic Stadium Friday will view the opener here. Thursday's attendance should be even better than Tuesday.

The old Summerside-Charlottetown feud is beginning to show itself again. As long as it is kept on a proper level it is a fine thing. Both centres can benefit by the rivalry.

The present series has all indications of being a thrilling one, with both teams having plenty of backers who will tell you there's nothing to it.

We look for Royals to even the affair here on Tuesday but that doesn't say they will. Aces have played some great hockey at the Sports Arena this season and Tuesday could be another of their good nights. With the final game in Summerside, if the series goes the full seven games, Royals realize that they must grab a win before Civic Stadium fans. It certainly can be done but it is going to be a mighty tough task.

Both Royals and Aces know this. Royals certainly can't afford to drop one at the Sports Arena if they hope to meet the New Brunswick winner. Aces, on the other hand, figure that a win for them here in Charlottetown would be a most decisive factor in this best-of-seven series.

The fun has just started.

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P.E.I. Quartet Draws Bye In First Round Of 'Spiel

QUEBEC (CP)—Three favored western rinks will meet comparative underdogs today in the opening draws of the Canadian curling championship.

Herb Olson's Alberta quartet from the Edmonton Curling Club meets Newfoundland in the first draw, at 3 p.m. EST, and in the 8 p.m. draw goes against Prince Edward Island.

Manitoba's Winnipeg Elwood rink, skipped by Dr. Dick Bird, tangles with the New Brunswick team this afternoon and Ontario tonight while Saskatchewan meets

Northern Ontario and Newfoundland respectively. Saskatchewan is represented by the Richardson rink of Regina. Other opening-round draws see Ontario against Quebec and British Columbia against Nova Scotia while Prince Edward Island draws a bye.

Quebec meets Nova Scotia and Northern Ontario goes against New Brunswick in the second round, with the bye going to British Columbia.

Ten rounds are played in the round-robin tournament with each club drawing one bye. The last draw is slated for Friday afternoon with playoffs at night in the event that two or more rinks are tied for first place.

Since the championship started in 1927, playoffs for first place have been necessary on eight occasions. On the other hand 10 rinks have swept through the competition undefeated. Manitoba

has seven perfect years while Nova Scotia, Saskatchewan and Alberta each have posted one 10-0 won-lost year.

All competing rinks arrived here Saturday by special train from Montreal and were met by the band of the Royal 22nd Regiment and about 100 curling officials and enthusiasts.

They were guests at a dinner given by the city of Quebec and at various parties and receptions. The draws were made at the curlers' banquet Sunday.

The Dominion Curling Association also announced during the banquet that the 1960 championship will be held at Port Arthur and Fort William, Ont., March 7-11.
