Kensington Group Present Play

"Bringing up Mother", by the Kensington United Church Young Adult group, should be a must for all who enjoy first class acting, in a 2-act comedy, which is a riot of fun from the beginning to end.

George MacLeod (Mrs. Bruce MacLeod) is the spirited mother Mrs. Maggie Fitzgerald who is being turned into a "lady", which she herself claims she has always been, by her lovely daughter, Mary Louise, excellently impersonated by Jean Davison, a newcomer to the stage.

Mrs. Hunter Chase, who in real life is Janie Woodside (Mrs. Joseph Woodside) a social climber, and her daughter, Drusilla, played to perfection by Thelma Adams, have like the Fitzgeralds, gone to Europe, where all three acts take place, to find culture, and more important, titled husbands.

They become acquainted with several titled and very, very aristocratic but penniless persons, who cultivate the Americans for one and only one reason, their evident wealth.

To her own utter amazement, Maggie Fitzgerald almost becomes, (in her own words), the Duke of Raspberry, but is fortunately rescued in the nick of time, as is also her ambitious daughter, Mary Louise, by sutors from their homeland, America, who love the ladies for what they are, not for what they have.

Nothing daunts Maggie Fitzgerald, at least not for long, and she is supported by a cast, each of whom becomes for the moment, the character, he or she is portraying. Since the play is so well written that each character is given exceptional dramatic possibilities, the net result is an evening of super entertainment, guaranteed to make the most sombre of mortals forget his troubles.

The array of beautiful costumes worn by the cast, in the various scenes is a delight to the eye, and the enunciation of each player, is without exception, so clear, that every word can be heard without effort by everyone in the audience.
