Summerside Completes Street Paving Program

Summerside's extensive street paving program has been completed. It has been learned from Councilor J. L. Driscoll, chairman of the street committee. The contractors were Morrison and MacRae Ltd. and the material used in all cases was cement.

A section of Notre Dame Street West that was included in this year's plans was not done on the advice of engineers as considerable excavation had been done here for water and sewerage purposes and it was thought better to let it settle for a year before paving. The street is paved beyond the entrance to the Trotting Park and only about 660 feet remains to be done. There will then be a space of about 200 feet to where the street joins Water Street but this is outside the Town limits. However, it is hoped that the Provincial Government will do the job, thereby completely paving what will be another entrance to the Town from west.

80 British Coal Miners Die In Blazing Inferno; 120 Other Men Escape

CRESWELL, England, Sept. 26.—(CP)—Eighty coal miners died today in a blazing inferno almost 1,000 feet below the surface of Creswell Colliery, regarded as the safest mine in Britain.

One hundred and twenty men were saved and 19 bodies were recovered. Sixty-one other trapped miners were given up for lost by mining officials.

A flash of fire leaped on to rubber conveyor belts, knocked out the ventilating system, ate up the precious oxygen and choked the life out of the trapped men.

The 120 saved, caught nearer the surface, clawed their way to safety. They made the last few hundred yards on hands and knees.

Find Bodies of 19

Rescue workers penetrating a section only partially sealed off recovered and brought to the surface the bodies of 19 victims.

An official statement said there is "no possibility" that any of the other 61 trapped men are alive.

regarded as fundamental and unalterable.

The in-camera talks are expected to continue until late tomorrow.

Mr. St. Laurent's motion grew out of an earlier proposal by Premier Leslie Frost of Ontario that the conference go into private session with a fixed agenda. Some delegates felt this might restrict debate, and Mr. St. Laurent's substitute motion was adopted.

The Prime Minister, opening today's sitting as conference chairman, said he had heard with "much interest" yesterday's preliminary statements by the Provincial Premiers, many of whom suggested a definition of the fine lines dividing Federal and Provincial authority should accompany the steps to set up amending machinery.

Mr. St. Laurent was "more and more convinced" that the conference first should deal with the amending powers. After that, the other points could be taken care of.

He then touched on a new phase of the constitutional problem, which has emerged spontaneously since this meeting—the expressed desire of several provinces for a distinctively Canadian constitution written in Canada.

If, he suggested, a satisfactory method of amendment could be devised, "I do not know that anyone could object to basing the Canadian constitution for the future at least upon agreements between the Federal Government and the 10 Canadian Provinces."

The British North America Act, the present constitutional instrument, is an act of the British Parliament based upon resolutions drafted by the Fathers of Confederation more than 80 years ago. The power of its amendment has rested in Britain.

Duplessis Urges Understanding

Premier Maurice Duplessis of Quebec appealed to his fellow Premiers to respect and understand the problems and opinions of Quebec as Quebec, in turn, was prepared to respect and understand theirs.

In a brisk, pleasantly-accented voice, he told the conference: "It is possible, it is feasible, and I dare say it is easy for each of us by understanding one another, by realizing the problems of one another, by respecting the fundamental rights of one another, to arrive at a really Canadian agreement which will respect the foundations, the very basis of the federative system."

Premier Frost said he did not share the "pessimism" of other Premiers over the complex jurisdiction questions. He was inclined to agree with Mr. St. Laurent that

they could be easily resolved. Once the amending machinery was established, a "purely Canadian" constitution could be adopted. At present, in questions of joint concern to the Provinces and the Dominion, the Provinces had "very little protection."

His proposed motion for in-camera sittings would have confined the discussion to establishment of an amending procedure and a method for drafting a new constitution and to consideration of what constitutional provisions should be defined as fundamental rights.

Under the present constitutional setup, the United Kingdom must be asked to amend the B. N. A. Act for questions of joint concern to the provinces and the Dominion. In matters of exclusively their own concern, the Provinces and the Dominion are free to make amendments on their own behalf.

This request is due to the fact that many turnips are being turned down on inspection this year due to a considerable infestation of maggot in the crop which is causing a loss to the Province estimated by one farmer as over a million dollars.
