Let's Talk It Over

THE SPELLING TYRANTS

One way to make a poor speller still worse is to try to make him learn to spell correctly every word he uses. Poor spellers are so scarce they take a long time to learn to spell words. That's pretty obvious, isn't it? Suppose they come up to Grade VIII or IX with a very small collection of words which they can spell correctly. Then some energetic teacher takes them in hand and resolves that they shall spell correctly every word they use in written work, even in geography, geometry, and such subjects. For poor spellers that is setting an impossible task, one that will give the victim a very bad case of spelling indigestion. It's like taking charge of a boxer who has neglected his road work, and in order to bring him up to schedule get him to run 100 miles the first day.

If someone stood over us when we were reading an interesting book, and insisted that we learn to spell every word we came across in our reading, our interest in the book would quickly die. We'd feel very much like throwing the book in the furnace and going for a walk.

In English there are three vocabularies: a reading vocabulary, the amount of words you can recognize and know the meanings of in the context; a speaking vocabulary, the amount of words you can pronounce correctly and know the meanings of; and a writing vocabulary, the number of words you can spell in addition to knowing their use. A person's writing vocabulary is nearly always much smaller than are his speaking and reading vocabularies.

Of course, it is true that correct pronunciation will help spelling, and vice versa, but if you can get a naturally poor speller to learn to spell a reasonable percentage of the words in his writing vocabulary, you are doing pretty well. If you expect him to spell correctly all the words in all his text books, you can work your head off at the task of trying to make him do this, and in the end you will be doomed to bitter disappointment.

Spelling texts are carefully graded to make a student proficient in spelling the words of his writing vocabulary. Readers are not. If they were, you wouldn't need the spellers at all. Nine-tenths of the information we get in the post-school world is obtained from reading or listening, and if you know what the words mean, you will gain the information whether you can spell them or not.


