

Curious Prophecy.

The Emperor held out his hand, and the countess, after examining the lines, gravely said: "Your Majesty is destined to live ninety-six years." The Emperor, it is added, was much struck by the coincidence.

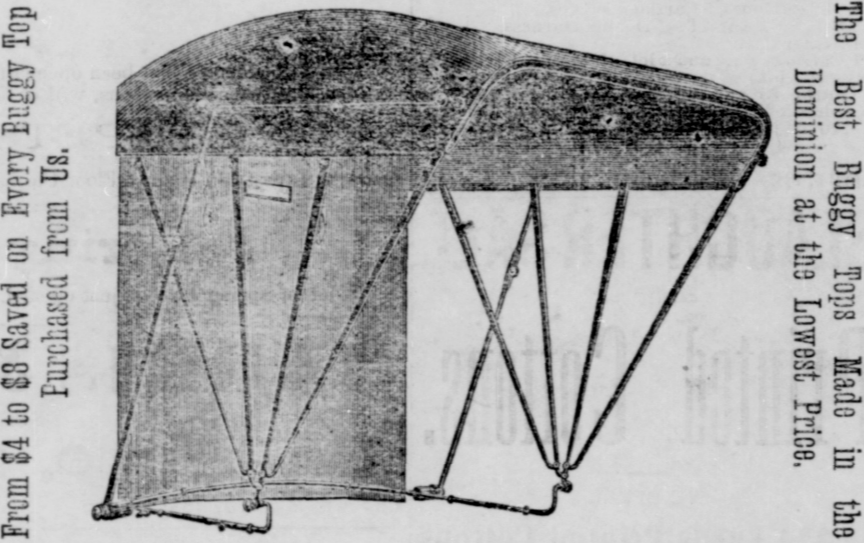
