### Vocational Aid To Save Province \$300,000

The provincial government will save approximately \$300,000 as a result of the six-month extension of the federal-provincial agreement on technical and vocational training assistance.

Under the agreement, which was to expire March 31, the federal government provides 75 per cent of the capital cost of vocational training facilities in the provinces. When the agreement expires, the federal government will pay half of the cost of capital construction.

Hon. George Dewar, M.D., minister of education, said yesterday "the extension is worth about \$27,000 to us on the Provincial Vocational Institute, now under construction on the outskirts of Charlottetown."

"We expect that slightly over \$1,000,000 will be spent on the construction of the institute between March 31 and Oct. 1, the date the agreement expires.

"There will also be a saving on the vocational facilities in Summerside. This saving will be of several thousand dollars, at least, and could go as high as \$10,000.

The telegram, in part, read: "Under present circumstances, you will appreciate it is not possible to make any amendment to the technical and vocational training act. I am pleased, however, to inform you of government decision to have 75 per cent federal contribution to provincial expenditure on technical and vocational training capital projects apply to work carried out prior to Oct. 1, 1963, on approved projects for which contracts have been awarded prior to April 1, 1963."

## 15-Year-Old Czech Describes Daring Escape From Homelands

DARTMOUTH, N.S. (CP)—Two days of tense waiting in the cramped fuselage of an airliner, shivering from the cold and in constant fear of detection was part of the price a 15-year-old Czechoslovakian boy paid for freedom.

In his first interview since leaving a Cubana airlines plane at Gander, Nfld., Dec. 21, Milos Anthony Navratil told of his daring escape from his homeland under the noses of Communist police.

Immigration authorities in Ottawa have revealed that Milos has been given a home here by Mr. and Mrs. Jaroslav Tichy. The immigration department said "arrangements to provide for his welfare, a home and education satisfactory to immigration authorities have been made with Mr. Tichy for as long as necessary."

With Mr. Tichy acting as an interpreter, Milos told how he spent many days going to the airport in Prague and watching the various aircraft coming and going. He kept notes of where each aircraft was headed.

"On Dec. 19," he said, "I saw a Cubana airplane which was going to land in Prague. I checked an airline magazine and learned that the plane was bound for Havana with a stop in Canada."

He said he went to the airport and watched the plane land. The baggage and pilot's compartment doors were left open after passengers and crew left the plane.

Milos said the airport was swarming with armed police, but the plane was not heavily guarded. However, there was 130 yards of open space between him and the aircraft.

His chance came as another aircraft prepared to take off. While everybody was watching the plane prepare for take-off, Milos bolted toward the plane and scrambled into the baggage compartment.

He said he hid between a bank of cables and the outer skin of the plane. "I stayed there not daring to move for fear that a sound would attract the guards."

He waited for the plane to leave with a long cold one. Wearing only light summer clothes and carrying with him a bit of food and bottle of water, he spent two days and nights in the tail of the plane before it left the airport.

"I was shivering from the freezing temperatures and terrified that I would be discovered by the crew of the plane." He said it was so cold in the plane at night that the bottle of water he had with him froze.

Only after the plane had taken off did he dare come out from his hiding place.

"The plane was in the air a very short time when it started to land. By this time I was nearly out of my mind with the cold so I moved from behind the cables and snuggled up to some boxes to keep warm."

"Shortly after the plane landed someone making a routine check opened the door and shone a flashlight in my eyes. I was ordered out of the plane."

Milos said he found out he was in Shannon, Ireland when he got out of the plane.

He said he was given a choice by the Irish police officer of staying in Ireland or continuing to Havana. He said he chose to stay aboard the plane and take his chances on getting off in Canada.

"When the plane landed at Gander, immigration authorities found I did not have a passport and the Cubans had to admit I was a stowaway. The immigration officer asked me if I wanted to remain in Canada or go on to Havana."

"When I chose to remain, the Cubans became very angry. I could see the anger flashing in the pilot's eyes."

The boy stayed in Gander for two weeks where he had Christmas dinner with an RCMP officer. He was later transferred to immigration headquarters in Halifax.

LEAVES FAMILY  
Milos said he left his mother and father and three younger brothers in Czechoslovakia. He said he didn't tell anybody about his plan to escape.

He said his father had owned a small chemical factory but it was nationalized by the Communists and his father was employed as a spray painter in an automobile factory.

The immigration department in Ottawa said Milos was free to communicate with his parents "and no action is to be taken which might prejudice him in relating his parents should he wish to do so voluntarily."
