Major Tierney Remembered
Prior To His Retirement

Major D.F. Tierney who has been employed with the Marine Services Branch, Department of Transport here since April 1921 is retiring on pension July 1st. Last evening he was suitably remembered by his co-workers who presented him with a beautiful set of luggage and a few fishing flies. The address was read by E.K. MacNutt, District Marine Agent. The presentation was made by Jack Lund, wharf foreman.

Major Tierney was born in Souris. He was educated in the local school and at Prince of Wales College. He was vice-principal of Souris High School until he enlisted for service in World War I in 1916. He served in Trench Mortar Battery, was seriously gassed and returned to England. He returned to Canada in December 1918 shortly after the Armistice was signed.

He spent a year in Union Commercial College here and joined the Civil Service in October of 1919. He became associated with the Soldiers Civil Re-establishment Branch. Two years later he was transferred to the Department of Transport and served continuously with them until his retirement.

Ch'town And District Labor
Council Annual Meeting

The first annual meeting of the Charlottetown and District Labour Council, C.L.C. was held last night in the Labour Hall, Queen St. Elected to executive positions for the forthcoming year were: Pres. J.M. McAlduff; 2nd Vice Pres. Alex. MacLean; Rec. Sec. Russel Doyle; Treas. Basil Molyneux; Sgt. at Arms, Wilfred MacLean; Committee Chairman; Education, Alex. MacLean; Organization, J.B. Brown; House, Frank Galand; Negotiating, J.B. Brown. Balloting had to be conducted on all offices.

In his annual report, President Alex. MacLean referred to the merger of the two largest labour bodies in Canada into the Canadian Labour Congress which was followed by the amalgamation of the two Labour Councils in the City. "Locally, we have made the greatest step forward that has been made in our history," he said. To support this statement, he referred to the reports of the various Committees. "This has not been accidental," Mr. MacLean continued. "Neither has it been the result of the activities of the officers of the various Unions but is first and last, a result of the support of the rank and file members of the Unions concerned."

Mr. MacLean cautioned the Council that they were in no position to rest on the foundation built by the movement and urged the same initiative and co-operation among the members in the future as had prevailed in the past year.

The report of the Organization

Committee was given by its Chairman, P.J. MacDonald and showed four new Locals chartered, new agreements signed, six agreements renewed with revision and amended. Mr. MacDonald noted that a high standard of principles had been maintained by the various Unions in their negotiations. He closed his report with an optimistic forecast for organization in the coming year.

The Education Committee report, submitted by J.M. McAlduff, was highlighted by the Week-end Institute held in February and its attendant social function. The report stressed the need for an expansion of educational features to include those outside of DDT labour movement. Mr. McAlduff voiced the thanks of the Council to the local press and radio for Local Union functions.

The Legislative Committee, J.B. Brown Chairman, reviewed the scope of the brief presented to the Provincial Government and listed the legislation which was passed. It is the feeling of this Committee that although some considerable amount still had to be accomplished before labour on P.E.I. had legislation comparable to the other maritime provinces. However, it was felt that time would remedy this situation.

An interject statement was submitted by the Treasurer, Russel Doyle with the audited report for the fiscal year to be tabled at the next meeting.

It was announced that Donald MacDonald, Secretary Treasurer of Canadian Labour Congress would visit the Council on the night of their regular meeting in August.

New Pest Causing Concern
To Farm Producers Here

A new pest the Web worm, is causing very considerable difficulty in various agricultural crops in the Province at the present time, F.M. Cannon, Officer in charge of the Laboratory of Plant Pathology, told the Guardian last night. It has become so bad the last few days that it is attacking practically every kind of crop, Mr. Cannon said.

For example some clover fields are in bad shape. The worm ties

the clover leaves together, with a sort of fine silk thread membrane and then feeds from the underneath.

This could become very serious and the situation is causing a great deal of concern. It is impossible to spray clover with the usual DDT spray because the residue of the poison would poison the cattle as the hay is so near to cutting time.

NEARING PUPAE STAGE
Mr. Cannon observed, however, that he hopes the worm may be nearing the pupae stage and its potential threat to the clover crop, and to other crops affected would cease.

They are also showing up on strawberries and Mr. Cannon says he never saw them on strawberries before. In this case they tie the petals on the blossoms together and feed from the underneath.

Grain crops are also being damaged by the pests. If the situation keeps developing, it may be that we shall have to advise farmers to spray their grain fields, he stated.

The pests are also showing up on cucumbers, beans and practically all kinds of vegetables, he said.
