THE QUEEN'S VISIT TO IRELAND

A satisfactory proof of the fact that "the Green Isle" is contented and happy as part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland is found in the enthusiastic reception of the Queen, to-day, and the contentment and prosperity which prevail. Whether or not the conditions would have been better if Ireland were now separated from the United Kingdom and Mr. Michael Davitt or Mr. John Redmond and other professional politicians and demagogues with whom she has been cursed were in office and power there, is a question that we leave to our astute Guardian. It is evident, at all events, that the action of the House of Lords which prevented the separation that the House of Commons would have accomplished has resulted beneficially to Ireland as well as to the whole country; and the three Kingdoms in this time of stress and trouble present an united front to the world. That the people of Ireland have practically acquiesced in the action of the House of Lords and the will of the whole people as subsequently expressed, is proved by the rousing reception that is being given the Royal and Venerable lady who represents the authority and dignity of our United Empire. Let us hope that the lesson will not be lost upon those who would now destroy our unrivalled constitution by hampering the independent action of the second Chamber of Parliament. With justice and charity prevailing throughout the land, while every movement by which the bounds of liberty are enlarged is extended to her, Ireland must, in the future, partake in every national and imperial triumph and in every prosperous event. The unhappy past of Ireland will, ere long, be completely forgotten, or remembered only to induce the feeling of thankfulness that a happy change has taken place. The visit of the Queen to Ireland, is at once a proof and a guarantee of the reality of the improvement that has already set in. Ireland has been known as the Emerald Isle and a very precious gem among the nations. Her sons have, in all ages, been renowned for their bravery in the field and their eloquence in the council. Many of them are playing leading parts in the great drama of British Imperial development which is now proceeding. Their distinguished skill and valor in battle have lately been shown among the korjes of South

Africa; and it is to mark her admiration of the loyal and gallant conduct of the Irishmen, that the Queen visit Ireland today. The royal tribute is appreciated by the warm-hearted people of Ireland. The Irish air is rent by the acclaims of thousands of Irish voices invoking blessings upon the aged lady and gracious sovereign whose power is, subject to the wise provisions of the British Constitution, "Broad based upon the people's will And compassed by the inviolate sea."

MR. WISE'S RESIGNATION.

The Patriot repeats its statement concerning Mr. Wise's resignation. Well, here is the definite counter-statement of Mr. Wise, himself:

SIR,—The Patriot's article in its issue of March 30th, in so far as it refers to my resignation as a member of the Legislative Assembly of this Province, is misleading and untruthful.

Being dissatisfied with the conduct of Mr. Farquharson and his Government, I felt that I could no longer support the Government on the floor of the House. I therefore decided to resign my seat and give the district which I have had the honor to represent for so many years an opportunity to either approve or disapprove of the policy of the Government.

On the 28th of February, in the presence of Mr. Murdoch McLeod, of West River, Mr. John McSween, of Colville, and Mr. John H. Bell, of Charlottetown, I signed and handed my resignation to Mr. Farquharson with instructions to have the same transmitted to the proper quarters. This resignation was given to Mr. Farquharson and accepted by him on the express understanding that an election would be immediately called to fill the vacancy caused by my resignation in order that the district would not be unrepresented when the house meets; and in order to avoid any misunderstanding on this point Mr. Farquharson gave a written undertaking to do so, which undertaking accompanied the resignation.

Mr. Farquharson has not carried out his promise. My resignation is in, but no election has been called.

I may say that a few days after my resignation was handed him, Mr. Farquharson informed me that a word had been left out in my resignation, and that it would be necessary to sign a new one. This I did. My so doing in no way affected my original agreement.

JOSEPH WISE.

North Milton, April 2d.

This is a clear and manly letter. Mr. Wise's motives were, evidently, right. The electors sent him to the Legislature to support the Peters Administration; he found that he could not support its successor, the Farquharson Administration; and he resigned the trust he had received from the people, first stipulating that the vacancy created should be filled by an election forthwith. The course he adopted was a proper one. But he is not a lawyer, and the tricksters of the Government have taken advantage of him. The agreement has not yet been fulfilled. An election has not been held. But Mr. Wise is out of his seat! He and the electors of the Second District of Queen's have been made the victims of a rascally trick in order that the Government may have one opponent less on the floor of the Legislature.

We prefer to accept as true the definite statement of Mr. Wise—who mentions the witnesses of the "express understanding" arrived at between himself and Premier Farquharson.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

A Redistribution Bill in the interests of the country and a Gerrymander Bill in the interests of the Liberal party are—as the Guardian would see if it were not, blinded by party prejudice—two different things. Probably the best thing of all would be a judicial commission invested with full power to redistribute the seats of the House of Commons, impartially, according to the provisions of the British North America Act, at the close of each decennial census.


