# Canada's New Flag Is Hoisted With Prayers, Unity Appeals

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's new maple leaf flag was hoisted up the flagpoles Monday with prayers and appeals that it flutter over a united country.

Said Governor-General Vanter: "I appeal to all Canadians to set aside pettiness, selfishness and intolerance where they may exist, and to cultivate a spirit of brotherhood and mutual confidence."

Prime Minister Pearson, "and God bless Canada." Both men spoke in the historic echoing Hall of Fame in Parliament's Centre Block, shortly before the new flag was hoisted on a white, temporary flagpole just outside the door, under the Peace Tower.

## REACTION IN LONDON LUKEWARM TO FRIGID

LONDON (CP) — Canada's new national flag fluttered bravely over London for the first time Monday and was greeted by comments that ranged from lukewarm to frigid.

The new flag—the maple leaf on a white background—was hoisted at Canada House by a color party from the three military services just as Big Ben struck noon. A crowd of more than 100, mostly made up of Canadian government officials and their families, watched the 15-minute ceremony in silence. There was neither cheer nor applause.

# Farm Hand Arrested In Teacher's Death

STRATFORD Ont. (CP)—John Pitman, 21 of Saint John, N.B., charged with the capital murder of school teacher Marianne Vandervliet, 21, was brought here in police custody Monday following his arrest in Sarnia. He is to appear in magistrates' court Wednesday.

A warrant for his arrest was issued after the Vandervliet girl was found shot to death Sunday in her parents' farm home in Dublin, about 15 miles northwest of here.

Police arrested him and escorted him here. Miss Vandervliet, a teacher at Stanley Park Public School in Kitchener, had come home for the weekend to visit with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Foort Vandervliet. The family came to the Dublin area from Holland several years ago.

## Light Legislative Program Forecast For Local House

The 1965 session of the Legislative Assembly, which will open Thursday afternoon with the reading of the Speech from the Throne by Lieutenant Governor W.J. MacDonald, may see little in the way of new legislation.

Indications so far are that legislation will be light and the House will turn its attention to such matters as Maritime Union, transportation, federal-provincial relations and the question of provincial responsibility toward the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building.

Conservative and Liberal members are expected to be on their toes constantly with Premier Walter R. Shaw's government holding a voting majority of three and Liberals, under Opposition Leader A.W. Matheson, expected to take advantage of every possible opportunity to unsettle the government.
