N. B. Labor Groups Urge Chignecto Canal Project

FREDERICTON (CP)—Legislation for an immediate start on construction of a Chignecto canal was urged in a brief submitted to the New Brunswick cabinet Thursday by the New Brunswick Federation of Labor and the Brunswick Council of Labor. "We labor people," the brief stated, "like many other groups, are considerably worried as to the effect on the economy of New Brunswick of the completion and full operation of the St. Lawrence seaway project. No person can, of course, predict what its effect will be, but it is too apparent that one of our largest sources of employment and income, our shipping industry, cannot but be adversely affected."

S. W. Leard Rejects Proposal Commission Study The Rights of Indians

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister St. Laurent Thursday rejected Opposition Leader Diefenbaker's suggestion that a royal commission be set up to determine the rights of Indians. He gave no direct reply to Mr. Diefenbaker's request that eviction of 118 residents of the oil-rich Hobbema Reserve in Alberta be postponed until the prime minister can look into the matter. "But he indicated the government might do something about having their eviction appealed to the courts. Deadline for this appeal is Feb. 6."

Nehru "Pained" Over Treatment

MADRAS, India (Reuters)—Prime Minister Nehru said Thursday he is "pained" that so many of India's friends treated her claims on Kashmir "very casually" in the United Nations Security Council debate. Addressing a public meeting at Madras University, Nehru denied that India used "double standards"—one for the dispute with Pakistan over Kashmir and another for world affairs. "In a later speech, the Indian prime minister urged the world to 'develop the qualities of strength which the West exhibits, but base it on gentleness' to avoid annihilation by hydrogen bomb warfare."

Chinese Mark Start Of Year of The Rooster

HONG KONG (AP)—Millions of Chinese here celebrated Thursday with firecrackers and the burning of joss sticks the beginning of the year of the rooster and the passing of the year of the monkey. But not in Communist China. The lunar new year in cities of the Orient and in Chinatowns all over the world is a time to please the gods and to settle your debts—even if you go bankrupt doing it. But on the Chinese mainland the Red rulers—frowning on tradition and superstition—have dropped the moon calendar. The lunar years go in cycles of 12 and are named for animals. The rooster year is regarded as a year of prosperity.

Liberal Member Of Quebec House Expelled 8 Days

QUEBEC (CP)—Emilien LaFrance, Liberal member of the Quebec legislative assembly for Richmond, was named Thursday by Speaker Maurice Tellier and expelled from the legislative assembly for eight days. The expulsion came after Mr. LaFrance said that those who have been elected under false pretences in this province are those who "made the province drunk." He refused to withdraw the statement.

Ford Strike In U. K. Has Ended

LONDON (AP)—Union leaders agreed Thursday night to call off a week-old strike that crippled Britain's giant Ford automobile organization and brought idleness to 21,400 workers in six plants. After all-day talks in London between the Ford management and representatives of the Amalgamated Engineering Union, union officials said they would order 5,000 strikers back to work Monday at the Briggs Motor Bodies Plant, a Ford subsidiary, in Dagenham.

Protest Welcome Given King Saud

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—The AFL-CIO adopted a strong protest against President Eisenhower's welcome of Saudi Arabian King Saud. The council issued a statement saying Saud is a slave owner and an anti-democratic monarch. It said while the U.S. "shows honors on King Saud, he is busily engaged in plotting against the free world."

Sen. Power May Head Committee

OTTAWA (CP)—Senator Charles (Chubby) Power, 69-year-old wartime air minister, likely will be named chairman of the special Senate committee set up to study land use in Canada, it was learned Thursday. He will probably be chosen when the committee, formed by the Senate Wednesday, holds its organizational meeting next Wednesday.

Aged Man Burned To Death In Nova Scotia

SHUBENACADIE, N.S. (CP)—John Lynch, 81-year-old widower, burned to death early Thursday when fire destroyed the small house where he lived alone at nearby Coldstream. An inquest jury returned a verdict of accidental death.
