Figures Show Increase In Traffic To Province

The enormous increase in traffic to and from Prince Edward Island since 1941 is emphasized in a report covering rail, truck, car and passenger movement across Northumberland Strait for the period ending December 31st 1956. This report was prepared and released by Mr. B. Graham Rogers, Director of Transportation Department of Industry and Natural Resources.

According to this report, during the fifteen years between 1941 and 1956 passenger and vehicular traffic using both ferries increased steadily. Since 1941 the number of passengers and motor vehicles ferried on the Wood Islands route rose from 25,303 and 6,527.

During the same period passengers and vehicles using the Tormentine route also showed a great increase: 1941, 157,316 passengers and 25,093 motor vehicles; 1956 - 350,595 passengers and 128,082 motor vehicles. In 1943 the number of railroad cars ferried over the Strait by the CNR was 41,705, while in 1956 this figure had increased to 58,774.

Since 1942 passengers carried by MCA Island flights rose from 8,913 to 26,748, figures based on regularly scheduled flights only.

A comparison of the reported traffic totals for 1955 and 1956 indicates a substantial increase in almost every department, comparative movement figures with 1956 totals in brackets are as follows:

Wood Islands-Caribou route, passengers 81,798 (80,043); motor vehicles 28,849 (28,851); trucks only 6,418 (6,591); Borden-Tormentine route, passengers 344,836 (350,595); motor vehicles 123,145 (128,082); trucks only 16,038 (15,171).

According to Mr. Rogers' report the year 1956 saw a total of 16,343 carloads of freight moved to Prince Edward Island from the mainland, and 14,350 transported in the opposite direction. In the export column, potatoes accounted for the biggest item with a total of 9,559 carloads, with March, '56 being the heaviest month when 1,418 carloads of spuds were moved.

Next on the list came livestock, with 1,121 carloads, followed by turnips, 888 cars, less carload lots accounted for another 725 and a pulpwood 474, meats 292 and scrap iron 165.

On the import side less carload lots head the list with 2,966 carloads; gas and oils accounted for another 1,845 cars, and coal 1,833 followed by flour and feed 1,604. Next came fertilizer 985, lime 835 and 574, meats 237 and lumber 213.

In addition to the forgoing carloads 23,081, passenger, baggage, express, mail and empty railway cars were ferried both ways. This brought the grand total moved in both directions to 58,774. Over the past nine year period this represents an increase of over 10,000.

Suggests Ottawa Construct Atomic Plant On P.E.I.

The possibility of having the Federal Government start an atomic plant for the development of electrical energy in the Province was suggested by F.A. Large, Liberal, First Queens as a means of relieving the fuel and power shortage by which the Island is handicapped.

He said Canada was lagging behind in its atomic development program in comparison to that of Great Britain where he noted that the World's first atomic energy plant is generating electricity for the system known as Calder Hall.

Mr. Large said he understood that the cost of electricity supplied by the plant exceeds that of hydro electric power by a small margin. "As our neighbouring provinces have much latent power in their coal mines, I feel that any experiment in Canada should begin in this Province as the Maritimes area is a power deficiency area", he said.

"The possibilities which this would open up are unlimited", said Mr. Large, "as industries will follow cheap power, and our location in the Gulf of St. Lawrence

at the Head of the St. Lawrence Seaway."

RURAL ELECTRIFICATION - "I wish to commend the Government for the Rural Electrification program which was begun in 1954," said Mr. Large.

The standing of the First District of Queens in this Electrification is one which I think would be of interest to this House.

"Before the Government began this program the First District was electrified only by the Maritime Electric line which ran from Charlottetown to Borden and by a short line Hazelgrove to Graham's Road and the Villages of Emerald and Bradalbane.

"In 1954 the Clinton, New London section was the first begun as a result of a three year program advanced by the people of the District, this served 45 families over 8.4 mile section in addition a 1/4 mile section at Bradalbane was built.

"In 1955 the Park Corner, Sea View, Irishtown section was completed a distance of 8.2 miles serving 35 families.

"In 1956 the French River, Spring Brook, Long River section was completed for a distance of 14.6 miles serving 66 families.

OTHER SECTIONS - Across the River the Stanley Bridge, Hope River section was extended from New London for 11.1 miles to serve 42 people. At this time the Clinton line was extended 6 miles to serve 4 people and in addition the Argyle Shore section had 5.8 miles serving 24 families, the County Line Road (Continued on page 13 col. 3)
