Big Icebreaker To Be Launched

LAUZON, Que., June 3—(CP)—The biggest icebreaker ever constructed in North America will be launched June 12 from the Davie Shipbuilding and Repairing Company here and christened D'Iberville.

The vessel, built for the Federal Government, is the second largest in the world. She will be operated as an icebreaker by the Transport Department.

The ship is 311 feet long with a beam of 66 feet, seven inches. The next largest icebreakers are the United States Coast Guard's Mackinaw, which operates in the Great Lakes, and the Federal Government's N. B. McLean. A Russian ship is the largest in the world.

Edmonton, June 3—(AP)—The Donjek bridge at Mile 1130 on the Alaska Highway, the largest bridge-building project ever tackled by the Canadian army, will be officially opened June 15, Western Army Command announced today.

The 1,600-foot steel and concrete span, begun in 1949 and completed at a cost of \$2,500,000 replaces seven wooden trestles which each year have been threatened by floodwaters. The structure also will cut out a section of the highway dotted with treacherous curves and poor grades.

The bridge originally was started as a five-year project, but floods in 1951 gave it top priority and it was finished as quickly as possible.

Located in the Yukon only 300 miles from the Arctic Circle, the bridge presented almost insurmountable problems to army engineers.

In many instances steam had to be fed underground to soften the surface before cuts could be made. Often the men worked in temperatures which hit 40 and 50 degrees below zero.

LONDON, June 3—(CP)—The Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh will hold private square-dance parties to the accompaniment of Canadian recordings, it was learned today.

At the Queen's request, the recordings were made in a BBC studio with Anthony Griffin, formerly of the Canadian External Affairs Department, acting as caller for three Canadian couples.

Griffin, now in private business here, helped to make the square dance popular in Ottawa and was the caller at the party in Government House which the royal couple attended during their tour of Canada last year.

Square dancing has boomed in Britain since the royal interest became known.
