

Local and Other Items.

It thundered this morning? The bankers in Montreal predict a much higher rate for money. It is understood that a Canadian Life-Boat Service will be instituted shortly. The Canada Pacific railway now reaches a point 406 miles west of Winnipeg. The out of lumber in the Ottawa district this year promises to be unprecedented. CARRIAGE-BUILDERS in Fredericton are unable to secure enough workmen to fill orders. The earnings of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company for August were nearly \$2,000,000. IMMENSE treasure is said to have been discovered in a little island off the Chiriqui coast, South America. The interior of the Windsor, N. B., cotton factory is beginning to have a business looking appearance about it. The Republican Majority in Maine is nearly 10,000. Robie's vote for Governor is about 73,200, Plaisted's 63,500. RAILWAY building in Manitoba and the North-West is progressing rapidly, and new lines are being projected. GENERAL BUTLER has authorized the announcement that he will be a candidate for the Governorship of Massachusetts. A GENERAL movement is afoot at Dublin to present General Wolsey with a sword of honour on his return from Egypt. PARIS actresses, it is said, wear paper lace, which by night looks as beautiful and delicate as the best real lace, while it costs but a trifle. The total amount to the credit of Depositors in the Government Savings Bank on June 30th was \$12,295,000, deposits for June \$805,348. PHOTOGRAPHIC counterfeiters of five dollar Bank of Nova Scotia notes are in circulation, in Halifax, in small numbers. The issues are prior to 1881. NEW GLASGOW is one of the most enterprising and rapidly growing places in the Lower Provinces. It is said there is hardly a dwelling in the place to let. THE Tombstone, Arizona, editors who crossed to Sonora to fight a duel, had a dispute about the selection of weapons, and left the field without firing a shot. THE City of Cleveland, Ohio, has accepted Mr. J. H. Wade's "million dollar gift" of seventy-three acres of land at the eastern end of the city for a public park. A LODGE of naughty Good Templars in Montreal has had its charter cancelled because its members indulged in dancing and card-playing after lodge proceedings. THE Italian and Russian Governments are negotiating for an early resumption of the conference at Constantinople to consider the settlement of the Egyptian question. COURTESY has won a race at last, and won it "by a large majority." Hanlan, too, has taken up Kennedy's challenge, and the coming race will be the event in sporting circles for the next few weeks. A NEGRO lying drunk on the track of the Kingston and Pembroke Railway, on Saturday was pitched off by an outbound train, the only damage resulting being a cut head and a smashed whiskey bottle. THE cricket match between the team of the Wanderers' amateur club, of Halifax, and the St. John cricket club took place on the former's grounds, on Monday, and proved a hard defeat for the St. John men. DOES the weather change with the moon? Sir William Thomson tells the British Science Association that there is no connection between the two things, as far as he can discover, and he has studied them. MR. J. E. TETU, immigration agent at Emerson, reports about 7,000 immigrants having entered the province at the Gateway during the month of August, of whom some 1,323 persons were from the United States. THE first public meeting in Canada to express gratification over the success of the British arms in Egypt, was held in Montreal on Saturday. In many churches throughout Canada thanks were offered up for the victory in Egypt. THE old barracks at Laprairie, Quebec, built by the Imperial Government at a cost of about half a million dollars, were destroyed by fire Thursday. They had been handed over to the Canadian Government, and were in charge of Colonel MacLeod Moore. PATRICK RYAN, a pensioner living in Toronto, committed suicide on Friday by shooting himself. He took a musket which he had been cleaning in the armory, attached his suspender to the trigger and thus discharged the weapon. The ball went through his breast, killing him instantly. Ryan had been drinking. BAILEY McLAUGHLIN, while travelling in the woods near Fredericton University, on the 18th, found a large United States mail bag, empty, which apparently had been there for some time, and Postmaster McPeake sees connection with it and the robbery of the Fredericton post office in April, 1881. No papers of any kind were found near. SERVICE OF SONG.—Next Sabbath, instead of the regular Gospel meeting, there will be a service of song in the Young Men's Christian Association Hall. Members of the different Church choirs in the city willing to assist at this service, are invited to meet for practice on Friday evening, at 8 o'clock, in the Hall of the Y. M. C. A. THE R. C. Church at Dalhousie, was partly destroyed by fire on the 18th. The building is left useless for any purpose but to be torn down. The origin of the fire is unknown. No stoves were used in the building. It is supposed to be from fire thrown down by smokers, as it caught from the outside. There was no insurance. THE Halifax Herald reports that the Boston and Colonial Company's steamer "Worcester," Captain Hallatt, which arrived there on Saturday at 6 p. m. from Charlottetown, P. E. Island was detained and encountered severe weather on Friday being obliged to lay to off Whitehead. During the passage she lost two boats. The steamer sailed on Saturday at midnight, for Boston.

They were adjourned for a week and one was indefinitely postponed as the offender was left for parts unknown. THE man who picked up Dr. Hobkirk's Railway Rug on Monday afternoon, near the Railway crossing on St. Peters Road is requested to leave it at THE EXAMINER office. THE National Convention of Chiefs of Fire Brigades of the United States and Canada met at Cincinnati this week. Two hundred persons were present, including Capt. Shaw, of the London, Eng., fire brigade. I. O. O. F.—A special session of St. Lawrence Lodge will be held at Odd fellows' Hall, Queen Street, at eight o'clock this evening. Members of Wildey and sister Lodges respectfully invited to attend. While on his way to the city a heavy crash of thunder frightened his horse, and the animal ran away, upsetting Mr. Gay and breaking the wagon. Mr. Gay, after catching the runaway horse, hitched him up again, and started for the city, but did not arrive in time to catch the steamer. He telegraphed the team to postpone the match until his arrival tomorrow evening. THE CITY OF GLASGOW BANK.—Yesterday, at the High Court of Judiciary, Edinburgh, the Lord Justice Clerk, Lord Mure and Lord Craighill on the bench, Mr. James Nicoll Fleming, formerly a director of the City of Glasgow Bank, was charged with falsehood, fraud and wilful imposition and breach of trust and embezzlement. The accused pleaded "guilty" to issuing and uttering false and fraudulent balance sheet; but "not guilty" as to the rest of the indictment. The crown accepted the plea and the prisoner was sentenced to eight months imprisonment.—Times (Weekly Edition) London, 7th July, 1882. THE peach crop in the Southeastern States is reported to be exceptionally good, although the flavor is not so fine as some seasons. The New York Bulletin says that by the close of the season there will have been sent to that city 1,500,000 baskets and about 500,000 direct to New England cities. The canners of Baltimore and Philadelphia and co-operators located near the peach growing section have operated very heavily this year, using 1,500,000 baskets. Eighty evaporating establishments have been busy in Delaware and Maryland ever since fine fruit was ready to be picked. In Canada the crop is reported to be a very poor one and the prices for imported and native grown fruit are exceptionally high.

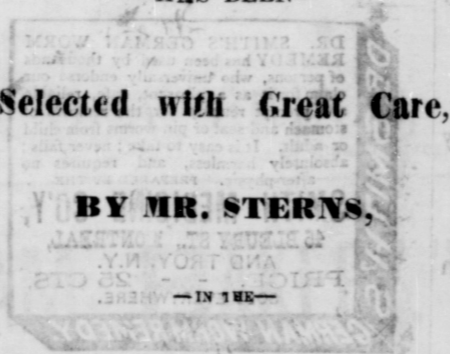

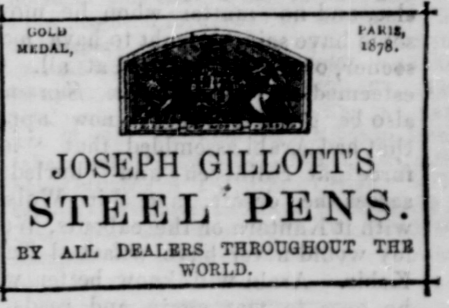
