SUMMERSIDE — A clean election in Prince County, free from liquor, money, or other inducements, was promised yesterday by the Prince County Progressive Conservative Association, on behalf of their candidate, G. Lorne Monkley.

In a challenge issued by the Conservatives to the Prince County Liberal Association, whose candidate, J. Watson MacNaught, has already promised to conduct a clean election contest.

The release issued by the Conservatives, called attention to a statement made a few days ago by their candidate, Mr. Monkley, that he would conduct his election campaign "according to the Canada Elections Act."

The statement issued yesterday was more specific, and stated that the county Progressive Conservative Association agreed with its candidate, and that this means "no liquor, money or other inducements would be used to influence the voting public."

to bring the same price regardless of breeding, and there seems to be no incentive in many cases now to use a top size, he said.

The meeting asked the minister of agriculture to authorize the issue of books of certificates to each bonus boar owner in the province as soon as possible, so he can furnish to the owner of each sow bred a signed certificate on which would be indicated the date of service, the breed of the sow, etc which could be passed on to the purchaser of the weaning pigs.

The association recommended that litters from such sows grade higher at market weight and pigs of lesser breeding should sell in the trade at a lower price.

The association suggested further that this action would enhance the sale of tested pure-
