OTTAWA — Starting tomorrow and continuing until August 18th, the 1955 Jaycee Canadian Junior Tennis Championships have brought to Ottawa the best junior tennis players in Canada, as well as a strong contingent from south of the border. Play gets underway at the Rideau Lawn Tennis Club at 9:00 a.m. with closed events running through to August 12th and Open Championships from the 13th to 18th. The tournament winds up on August 18th and 19th with a New England - Canada Boys Match.

Top Canadian juniors in attendance include Francois Godbout, a south-paw player hailing from Waterloo, Que., and Louise John of Quebec City, Quebec's Provincial Singles champion. In addition, Francois is a Canadian Junior finalist in '55, won the Doubles crown with Yvon LeBlanc, while Louise was also a double winner, taking both the Girls' and Junior Ladies' titles. Another outstanding star is Bill Reynolds, a winner of the Manitoba Junior Singles Championship and holder of the Junior Men's Doubles crown with Don McKelvey. Young Judy Borland, age 14, and younger brother Rick, 11, are taking their second trip to Ottawa—Judy as Manitoba Jun. for Ladies Singles and Doubles Champion, Rick as winner of Winnipeg City and District Juvenile Boys Singles.

Longest Village In The World Celebrates Bi-Centennial

BRISTOL, England (Reuters)—The world's largest airliner, the four-engined turbo-prop Britannia 100, nicknamed The Whispering Giant, will make a three-week tour of the United States, it was announced today.

It will be the first time the Britannia 100 has made the Atlantic crossing. If weather conditions are favorable it is possible that the London-New York run will

be made non-stop without the usual call at Gander, Nfld. Announcing the tour, the Bristol Aeroplane Co. said the Britannia will leave for New York Sunday and then go on to San Diego, Calif., where it will be the chairman of the company, is to speak at the International Aviation Turbine Conference. Propose Excise Tax On Magazines' Canadian Editors

OTTAWA (CP) — The Commons Tuesday night gave final approval without a recorded vote to a government bill to tax special Canadian editions of foreign magazines.

The taxing provision is contained in a bill to amend the Excise Tax Act which received first reading after a brief debate.

Except for two minor amendments, the bill is identical to a resolution proposed by Finance Minister Harris in his March 20 budget speech.

One is intended to block a loophole in the wording of the resolution which might enable evasion of the tax. The other would exempt from the tax foreign magazines of a medical or religious nature.

During debate on the resolution, Hon. W. Earl Rowe, acting Opposition leader, described the tax as "dishonest." He said it will not serve the purpose for which it is intended — to protect Canadian magazines against foreign competition.

Mr. Rowe said no legislation passed previously by the Commons "smacked so much of protection." A penalty on U.S. subsidiaries in Canada was dangerous because it established a precedent whereby the government could restrict competition whenever it pleased.

AMERICAN PROTESTS Introduction of the legislation followed months of uncertainty about whether the government actually would proceed with the new tax. During this period representatives of American publishers have had frequent meetings with Mr. Harris protesting that the tax is unfair and discriminatory.
