The steamer M. A. Starr, Capt. Ferguson, arrived from Halifax at half-past three o'clock this morning with a cargo of general merchandise, and sailed on return this afternoon with oats, potatoes and cattle.

The three-mile limit, which has caused so much trouble between Canada and the United States, covers about 1,100 miles of the coast of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and includes an area of 100,000 square miles.

LATEST advices from Rome, received by the Catholic clergy of Montreal, convey the information that the Pope has definitely decided to erect Montreal and Ottawa into Arch-Bishoprics. It may be some time, however, before this decision will be carried into effect, on account of certain difficulties regarding the division of the country.

A SUMMARY of crop reports from the Western and Southwestern States show that while the condition of spring and winter wheat remains unchanged on the whole, serious damage has been done in portions of Kansas and Southern Illinois by the chinch bug and Hessian fly, and in portions of Ohio, Iowa and Nebraska by heavy rains.

NEARLY A SEIZURE.—The fishing schooner Matthew Keane, Capt. Dixon, from Gloucester, Mass., entered the port of St. John's on Tuesday last in search of supplies. The Captain purchased ten bushels of potatoes, but sub-contrary to the usual custom, he took no explanation, in which his track pleaded ignorance of treaty breaking, and his vessel, after being detained for the day, and the potatoes having been put on shore again, were allowed to depart.

At the conclusion of Gladstone's address, Dillwyn (Liberal) member of Parliament for Swansea, arose and declared he had been authorized to speak for the Welsh dissidents, under certain contingencies. He now felt justified in making the declaration, and that was that the concessions offered were acceptable to Welsh dissidents and were by them accepted.
