### NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.

#### The School Question Again.

A Mandement to be Read.

OTTAWA, Jan. 3.—The Ontario elections are to take place next month. A dissolution will occur immediately after the close of the present session, about the middle of the month.

The Roman Catholic Hierarchy meet at Montreal on Wednesday to consider the Pope's Encyclical on the School Question. A mandement will be read in all churches next Sunday.

#### AN AMERICAN'S IDEA.

A Rather Good One Though.

A Canadian Battalion to be Sent to China.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—The London correspondent of the Sun cables the Sun that he is enabled to say that in the event of trouble in the far east the Canadian Militia will have an opportunity of covering themselves with glory. The war department and admiralty have, between them, drawn up a scheme whereby a battalion of this militia will be hurried to Hong Kong from Vancouver, the moment war seems imminent. They would reach China long before any force from England could get there and it is thought their co-operation would boom the imperial unity idea.

OTTAWA, Jan. 3.—General Gascoigne stated yesterday that he had not heard word of any proposal to send a Canadian regiment to China.

#### Ocean Steamer Wrecked.

HALIFAX, Jan. 3.—The steamer Gerona of the Thompson Line, was wrecked at Seal Island, with a cargo of wheat and oats, from Portland to India.

#### Troops Moving.

CAIRO, Jan. 4.—A battalion of Cameronian Highlanders has been ordered to be in readiness to ascend the Nile a fortnight hence.

#### Bicycle Race.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—Michael won the 25 mile bicycle race with Edward Taylor, contested here yesterday.

#### LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

LONDON, Dec. 31.—A despatch from Peking says the action of the British minister in asking the Chinese Government to delay the arrangements for the proposed Russian guaranteed loan of 100,000,000 taels for a few days to enable him to consult with Lord Salisbury in the matter, was largely influenced by British opinion in China. British residents throughout China are earnestly urging the financial intervention of England to forestall Russia in coming to China's relief. A special despatch from Shanghai says that communications are constantly passing between the British and Japanese officers, and it is understood that the Japanese ministers are trying to effect an approachment with England on the basis

LONDON, December 31.—A letter from Kobe says that military manoeuvres of great magnitude were executed in Japan last month for the first time since the war.

LONDON, Jan. 1, 1898.—The new year honors are an Earldom for Baron Salisbury the Lord Chancellor; peerage for Sir William Wallace Hoar, the well-known Lancashire Baron, and Sir Horace Brand Townshend-Farquhar, member of parliament for West Marylebone, baronetcies for Sir Saul Samuel, the agent general of New South Wales in London, and Sir Frederick Wigan, senior partner of the firm of Wigan company, and Mr John Wilfrid MacLure, member of parliament for South-east Lancashire, and knightage for the Hon. G. W. Barton, chief justice of Ontario. The persons honored with the order of companion of the bath, include Professor Darcey Thompson, the seal expert of the British foreign office. Mr. J. McLeavy Brown, the British consular agent at Zool is made a C. M. G. Thomas J. Linton the millionaire merchant receives a knighthood.

LONDON, December 31.—The Times, in its review of the events of the year this morning, after saying it is disagreeable to be obliged to record failure of the long efforts of Lord Salisbury and Mr. Cleveland to bring about an arbitration treaty, observes: "America's internal history may be summed up in three things: The passage of the Dingley tariff bill; the triumph of Tammam Hall; and the steady growth of a desire for a strong navy. The latter agitation finds its excuse in Cuba and Hawaii, but the more vehement advocates of the new policy make no secret that it is against England, and not Spain or Japan, that the main effort is to be directed."

QUEBEC, December 31.—At a dinner party at Spencerwood last evening Governor Chapeau announced that he was simply remaining in office at the request of the government to finish the business of the session and sanction measures he had announced in the speech from the throne. Neither he nor the premier knew who his successor would be, said he.

NEW GLASGOW, December 31.—William H. Snow, who came here about three years ago to manage Gordon & Keith's undertaking branch, left town this morning, and it is supposed went to the United States. A. Keith came to town on Wednesday morning and called on a number of people who appeared to owe bills to the firm for undertaking work and discovered that a large number had paid their bills, for which no credit for the money could be found on his books. Mr. Keith found that Mr. Snow had borrowed money from people who were in the habit of doing business with the firm. One party who loaned him \$25 had a bill against the firm. In order to get his money from Mr. Snow he got him to give him a note to the amount of the bill and the \$25 borrowed, amounting in all to over \$100. This seemed to have been charged as a liability against the firm. Mr. Snow's household effects have been attached by New Glasgow parties. It is said also that he got friends to endorse paper for him and contracted a number of bills in the stores. Gordon & Keith are not able to find out the amount of their loss, but it will be about \$600.
