VANCOUVER (CP)—An outdoor track and field training area unsurpassed anywhere is taking shape at the University of British Columbia.

It's based on a concept that comes from a few decades of mental doodling in Lionel Pugh's career, as one of British Columbia's top track coaches.

At 42, the former Oxford University coach has a chance to see it realized.

"I don't use the word 'challenge' to explain his engineering job," says Pugh, who is paid by the British Columbia government to head track coach at UBC. Pugh has obviously had a lot to think about.

And he thinks facilities must come first, because young people must be attracted to sports that are "very unattractive."

The training area is one big step. It is an all-weather track enclosing pits and runs for various events, a normal plan except that it is elaborate enough to keep more than 100 athletes busy at a time.

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His own job-finding service is some of the best in the world. He keeps them close by and available for daily workouts.

How are you going to give them competition? Travel widely to meet on the U.S. west coast. Pugh hopes to have a small team doing this soon.

Braves Ask For Federal Hearing

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Milwaukee Braves asked the federal court Monday to take jurisdiction in the legal fight over whether owners of the National League club should be allowed to move the franchise to Atlanta.

Counsel for the club filed petitions with the U.S. District Court clerk, and with the Milwaukee Circuit Court, where Judge Ronald A. Drechsel already had issued a temporary injunction against the club's transfer.

The legal manoeuvre cancelled a hearing scheduled for today before Judge Drechsel on whether the injunction should be made permanent.

Ray T. McCann, counsel for the Braves, said in the petition that "diversity of citizenship"—that the club was a Delaware corporation, with its principal offices in Chicago—was cause for moving the case to Federal Court.

Dale Kelenfeld, clerk of the Federal Court, said the next step in the proceedings would be determining setting a date for a hearing, after which the Federal Court might decide to accept the case, or return it to state courts.

"I would be very happy with it to start with," he said.

PLANS CLINICS

Coffey Sets A Record; Will Try For Another

REGINA (CP)—Erd Tommy Coffey of Edmonton Eskimos has set one Western Football Conference pass-catching record and will be out to establish another when Eskimos play their final league game Saturday.

Coffey caught 11 passes in a game against Calgary Stampeders last Saturday by being his receptions to 77 for the season, tied in 1959 by Calgary Banker Bob Taylor.

"Coffey has gained 1,112 yards on his receptions, just 14 short of the record set in 1959 by Earl Pitts of Winnipeg Blue Bombers."

Taylor holds down second place this year with 886 yards in 63 receptions and Saskatchewan Roughriders flanker Hugh Campbell has caught 59 for 866 yards and a league-leading 10 touchdowns.

Calgary fullback Lovell Coleman is well in the lead in the race for individual rushing honors with 1,270 yards on 247 carries. He was top ground-gainer in the conference last season.

Saskatchewan halfback Ed Buchanan is second with 1,247 yards on 168 carries and Brisbane.

Pitcher Fowler Is Given Release

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The Los Angeles Angels announced Monday they have given veteran pitcher Larry Fowler his unconditional release.

Fowler, 42, has been with the American League baseball club since his start in 1961. The past season he was a batting-practice pitcher.

"General Manager Fred Hasey wanted to give Fowler plenty of time to make another deal for himself," a team spokesman said today. "Fowler was highly effective in his relief roles."

Fowler's best years with the Angels were 1962 with a 4-3 record and 1963 with 5-3.

Father Time Of Cricket Is Dead

LONDON (Reuters)—Joseph Fillion, 102-year-old "Father Time of cricket," died in hospital following a stroke. He was announced here Monday.

A former professional cricketer with Staffordshire and Suffolk who had been umpiring for 50 years, Fillion was known down by a motor-scooter and had his right arm and leg in plaster.

Fillion gave up professional cricket to umpire when he was 50. He announced his retirement on Feb. 10 of this year — his 102nd birthday — "before I get too old."

Ahern Wins Prole In Halifax Birthplace Of Hockey

HALIFAX (CP)—Trophies, pictures, an 89-year-old pair of ice skates and what John E. Ahern considers proof that this old port city is the birthplace of hockey will be among collections the Nova Scotia Sports Hall of Fame when it opens its doors here.

Enlarged newspaper clippings referring to hockey played here in 1833 "proves that this is where it all started," says Ahern, who claims the game was born here in 1828.

Evidence that the Halifax public grounds had an indoor hockey rink in 1863 and the first grass tennis court in Canada in the mid-1850s will also be included, he says.

The sports hall, in temporary quarters in a portion of an industrial building, will be officially opened by Premier Robert J. Stanfield during the Atlantic Winter Fair. It will move to "more permanent quarters in Halifax Forum after the Fair.
