Newfoundland Said Healthy Despite Season Of Epidemics

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) - Despite some tough rounds with epidemics this year, Newfoundlanders are considered as healthy as Canadians anywhere else in the country.
Dr. John Davies, the province's health director, made this observation Tuesday as he thought back on a year when Newfoundland's 400,000 citizens were plagued with outbreaks of polio, influenza, measles, scurvy and a rare virus affecting the throat, head and chest.
Dr. Davies said Newfoundland is as prone to disease as any other province. "Don't forget that many of the outbreaks we've had occurred this year also in other parts of Canada," he said.
"But certainly the general health picture in Newfoundland compares favorably with the rest of the country."

LAGS IN TB
The only area where the province lags is in the fight against tuberculosis. "But even there, the picture is much brighter than it was 10 years ago," he said.
Five hundred Newfoundlanders died of TB in 1944. Last year the TB death rate in the province was 64.

Walter Davies, executive secretary of the Newfoundland Tuberculosis Association, predicted that in 10 years the fight will have been won "and we'll close all three TB sanitoriums in the province."
"Then this comes about and the money can be diverted, it will be indeed a blessing," he said.
The Association spends about \$2,000,000 annually for TB treatment.

Worst of this year's outbreaks - and the only disease to reach severe epidemic proportions - was polio which broke out in July. In its sweep across the province the crippling disease struck 151 persons bringing death to 12.

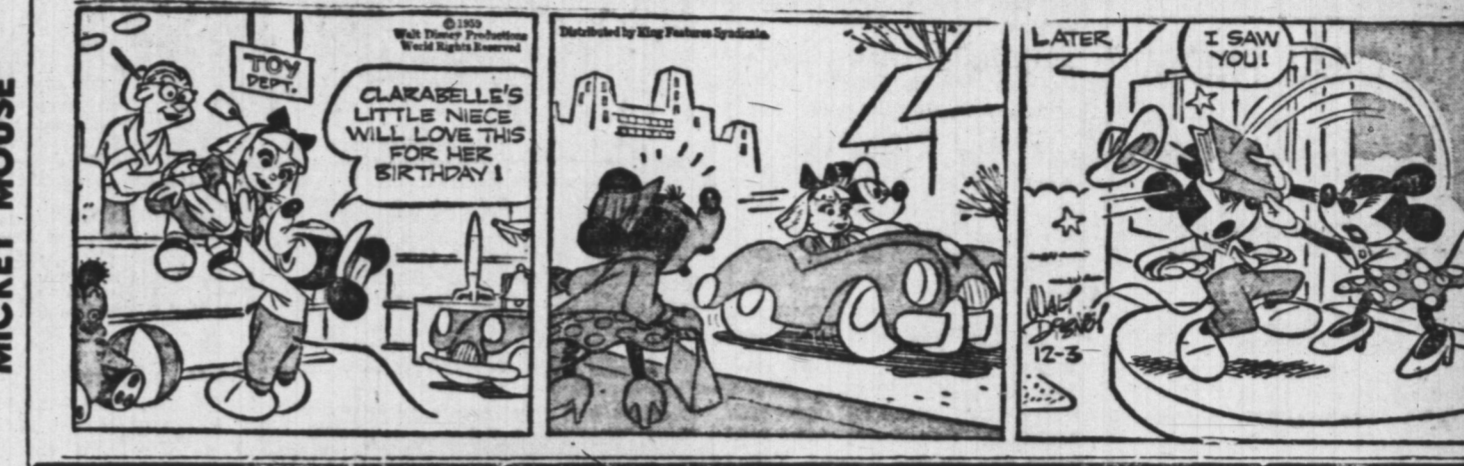

Winter Is Early In Southern U.S.

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) - Winter made an early invasion of the southern states Monday. Snow fell in some sections and reports of crop damage came from extreme south Florida where ordinarily warm breezes blow even in December.
Bright sunshine brought warmer temperatures Monday afternoon, but the cold wave was expected to send the temperatures near or below freezing again overnight in areas from the Carolinas to Louisiana.
Several points in the southland reported record lows for the date. In Montgomery, Ala., the 20-degree reading was the lowest for Nov. 30 since 1872.
The cold combined with a strong wind to cause considerable damage to bean and tomato crops in the truck farming area near Miami. The winter resort city had a low of 42 and was swept by icy winds that measured up to 40 miles an hour in gusts.
