Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, July 18.

An order in Council, dated July 5th, approves of the amendments and consolidations of the weights and measures regulations.

A deputation of Montreal and Quebec wholesale grocers to-day awaited upon the Minister of Customs in reference to the polariscope test of molasses, laid down in the Tariff Act last session of parliament. The duty upon molasses, imported direct from place of production, was fixed at one cent and a half a gallon for all under 56 degrees of saccharine strength. Recently cargoes arrived in Quebec which analyzed much above the grade and measure, accordingly subject to a duty of six cents a gallon. The deputation asked that either the test be raised to sixty degrees or that in testing molasses an average sample of cargo be used. The question was discussed for over two hours, when the deputation left on the assurance that the minister would carefully consider the matter and reply as soon as possible.

Stuart Henderson, solicitor for Bremner, whose furs were looted has made a formal demand upon General Middleton for payment of such furs. Unless the demand is complied with action will be commenced against Middleton to-morrow.

The Newfoundland Question.

TORONTO, July 17.

The following special cable appears in this morning's Globe: "London, July 17.—Premier Whiteaway, of Newfoundland, tells me to-day that he has had further interviews with the Colonial office. The whole case of the colony is now fairly before Lord Knutsford. Sir William certainly does not think the attitude of the imperial authorities is hostile to the colonial claims; and he is glad to find the real character of the issues involved fairly grasped by the press and public men here."

Another Storm.

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 17.

Another heavy storm visited this part of the state last evening, and did considerable damage to property. At the north of St. Paul, the brick factory of the Acme Chair Company was demolished. The wind caught the upper portion of the building, and cut it off as if by a knife, lifting it bodily and smashing it to pieces some distance away. At the same time, the walls were crumbled together like an egg shell, making it a total ruin. No one was hurt, as the help had gone home.

Pilgrims by Rail.

MONCTON, July 17.

Eighteen cars of pilgrims for the shrine of Ste. Anne de Beaupre left points north of Campbellton this morning. Many crippled and bedridden people were carried to the train on stretchers.

The Wheel of Fortune.

THE WIDOW OF A MILLIONAIRE DESTITUTE AND STARVING—SHE APPEALS TO A FORMER DOMESTIC FOR AID.

Georgia Alden, widow of the New York millionaire bank president and stock broker and who formerly resided with her husband in princely style in Westport, Conn., has written a letter to Mrs. Miller, a colored woman, formerly a domestic in her employ, asking for aid and stating that she was destitute and starving. Two dollars, all the money Mrs. Miller had was sent to Mrs. Alden. Her former friends when shown the letter refused to aid her. Mr. and Mrs. Alden were leaders in fashionable society circles at Westport 15 years ago. Their palatial residence was filled with servants and a small army of workmen kept the house and grounds in the best possible order. Business reversed finally came, then everything was disposed of to satisfy the claims of creditors. Mr. Alden died and his widow, shattered in health, started westward. She remained on the Pacific coast several years and recently took up her residence in the village of Manhasset, Long Island.
