POOR PROSPECT FOR THE MACKEREL FLEET - VIEWS OF AN EXPERIENCED SKIPPER.

A Port Hawkesbury correspondent of the Halifax Herald, writing on the 31st ult., says: The net fishermen did well this morning around Isle Madame and St. Peter's Bay.

The first of the Gloucester seining fleet for the season made their appearance on these shores last week. According to the Cape Sable Advertiser's shipping report, North East Harbor was the sheltering places for most of them during the dull weather of the latter part of the week.

He is as well acquainted with the habits of those fish as with the method of taking them. He did not speak very hopefully of the present outlook for a good run, and said the belief was prevalent that the doings would be very meagre this summer.

Reports from the banks are mostly of a discouraging nature. Many vessels up to a late date had found no fish at all, though cruising over a wide extent of ground.

It is said that some fine large mackerel are being caught in the traps outside of Yarmouth. The best of them are selling at 12 cents apiece in the Yarmouth fish market.

Traced to the Clan-na-Gael.

REVELATIONS SOON PROMISED IN THE DR. CRONIN MYSTERY.

A Chicago despatch of the 31st says: Chief of Police Hubbard as much as admitted to-night that his officers were on the eve of a great move in the Cronin mystery. It is said that the man who drove the doctor from his home on the fatal night has been identified, and that the murder conspiracy has been traced to camp 97 of the Clan-na-Gael which used to meet in the north side Turner Hall.

Mr. Luke Dillon, of Philadelphia, who is in Chicago as the representative of the Clan-na-Gael to watch the Cronin case, has been interviewed. "I think," said he, "that the ban of secrecy is now considered removed, so far as it affects members of our organization and the detection of the murderers of Dr. Cronin. The oath of secrecy must never conflict with the duty which we owe as citizens to the public."
