DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, May 14.

In answer to Col. O'Brien, Sir John Macdonald said no action had been taken on the petition received from Manitoba asking for the disallowance of the Act representing the school and the dual language.

In answer to Mr. Mitchell, Sir John Macdonald said the fishery negotiations at Washington were going on very pleasantly, and he might be able to give some positive information respecting them on Friday.

Mr. Labrosse asked if the members were to get any extra indemnity on account of the length of the session, and was answered in the negative by Sir John.

The House went into concurrence on the supplementary estimates.

The supply bill was introduced and read a first time.

After recess, the routine business yet standing on the order paper, was cleared off.

The Northwest bill yet stands, but is not to be proceeded with.

Sir John Macdonald announced in answer to Mr. Mills that no action had been taken with respect to the Middleton case, and that the General had not been heard from.

The House adjourned at 9:30 until Friday to-morrow being a state holiday. Business from the Senate will be taken up and prorogation will take place in the afternoon.

THE QUEEN'S ILLNESS

A SERIOUS TURN.

Uneasiness in Court Circles.

LONDON, May 14.

The Queen's sudden indisposition after holding the drawing room yesterday appears to be much more serious than it was at first supposed. Dr. Reid was summoned in the evening and suddenly again a short time afterwards. To-day he attended on the Queen early in the morning, when she was a little better. She went out for a short drive in a closed carriage, into which she had almost to be lifted, and on her return to Buckingham Palace the physicians were again summoned. The Conservative papers are very uneasy with regard to the matter, and attribute the indisposition to a cold, which is in reality a dropsical affection of the leg, which has got beyond control. It was announced that the Queen would leave for Windsor at noon, but was unable to go owing to increased weakness, and her departure was delayed until six o'clock this morning, when she started from London, accompanied by her physician.

"Gladstone" Distanced

KENTVILLE, N. S., May 14.

The much-talked-of race between the bay stallion Gladstone, owned by C. R. Bill, Jr., of Northville, King's Co., and the bay gelding Frenchman, the property of L. D. Windsor, Halifax, for \$500 a side, took place here to-day. The horses got a good send off, but soon Frenchman began to forge ahead, and in a short time it became apparent that Gladstone was out of the race. Frenchman came along the home stretch in fine style, and went under the wire with Gladstone at the distance post. After some little excitement it was discovered that the distance pole was in the wrong place and another heat was called on. In this heat, as in the previous one, Frenchman fairly flew away from Gladstone and went under the wire with the stallion distanced. Time, 2:34.

A Cotton Syndicate

MONTREAL, May 14.

It is rumored in cotton circles to-day that the mission of A. F. Gault to England has so far been successful, that negotiations with an English syndicate were the absorption of the cotton trade of Canada, at a price of ten million dollars is likely to become an accomplished fact. It is stated that our large mills have refused to inter the combine.

A Surprise.

LONDON, May 14.

The Parnellites sprang a surprise on their opponents in the House of Commons this afternoon by moving the second reading of the Irish Agricultural Laborers Bill, which proposes to use the church surplus to assist in the erection of laborers' cottages. The second reading of the bill was agreed to without division.
