

Prince Budlong scores Final Dash Upset

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Big Racing Program Expected To Attract Record MidWeek Crowd

The Old Home Week and Provincial Exhibition program reaches its highest peak this afternoon and evening when six classes, three in the afternoon and three in the evening, together with a full vaudeville program are expected to give huge crowds the biggest thrill-packed performance in the history of the annual event.

A total of 48 horses are entered in the six events. There are many well known horses from Island and mainland stables and indications are that the various classes will be keenly contested.

There will also be a parade of prize cattle, Holsteins and Guernseys, before the start of the night races.

Charles Stops Beshore In 14th Round To Retain Heavyweight Title

BUFFALO, N. Y., Aug. 15—(AP)—Ezzard Charles, bullied by mauling Freddie Beshore during the early rounds, stopped the Harrisburg, Pa., challenger in the 14th round tonight in the third successful defence of his N.B.A. heavyweight title.

Referee Barney Felix halted the contest with blood streaming from Beshore's puffed right ear and mouth while the crowd roared its displeasure.

The lean Negro champion from Cincinnati never dropped the swarming Pennsylvania Dutchman although he had him in trouble several times. Charles appeared ring-rusty and off in his timing after a 10-month layoff.

Small Crowd

A disappointing crowd of 6,298 paid only \$28,666.36 gross to watch the bout. It was the smallest crowd and gate in modern heavyweight title history. The previous low was \$48,192 for Joe Louis-Harry Thomas at Chicago Stadium, April 1, 1938. Low attendance was 10,609 at Madison Square Garden, March 29, 1940 for a championship fight between Louis and Johnny Paycheck.

As the promoters estimated they needed a gross of about \$50,000 to break even, they took quite a red ink bath.

Beshore's crushing style of fighting bothered the champion no end. He fought in spurts, apparently not sure of himself. Gathering steam in the late rounds, he bombed Beshore with hammering body and head punches.

Referee Felix had Charles out front 12-2 when he stepped between the blood-drenched battlers. Judge Anse Carroll saw it 12-1 with one even. Judge Leo Stachowiak had Charles out front 9-3 with two even. The AP card saw 10-2 with two even.

The end came suddenly. Just when it appeared that the 5-to-1 underdog challenger was going to last the route. A smashing right staggered Beshore as he came out to clinch. Another right to the head, followed by six straight punches without return, left Beshore wobbling in mid-ring with his hands down. Noticing the blood streaming from the ear cut, Felix intervened.

Charles weighed 183 1/4 for his title defense to 184 1/2 for Beshore.

Took Few Risks

With a Joe Louis match practically set for Yankee Stadium Sept. 27, Charles took few risks. He said later he had him trying to get out in the first round. Still the champion wound up with a cut left eye that also dripped blood.

"My timing was off," said Charles in his dressing room, "I couldn't get a good right hand shot at him. The guy hit me with more or less standup guys. I didn't know he was going to fight that way."

Jake Mintz, Charles' manager said he has a conference scheduled tomorrow with New York officials of the International Boxing Club to discuss the Louis match.

If Ezzard didn't expect Beshore to fight that way he was about the only person in the small crowd who didn't. Beshore, strictly a mauling body puncher, came out in a crouch, bobbing and weaving with head low trying to avoid Charles' heavy artillery. Some times he did. More often he didn't.

Beshore had a good share of the crowd with him because he gamely insisted on carrying the battle to the champion at close quarters.

Local boxing fans will have something to talk about during the next few days after reading of the excellent performance turned in by Cobey McCloskey at Halifax when he scored one of the fistful upsets of the year over Maritime middleweight champion Yvon Durelle by a unanimous decision on Monday night. Given little chance of being able to stay with the Bale Ste Anne, N. B. battler, Cobey came up to a really solid piece of fighting power that one Halifax sports writer termed "built along the lines of a fire hydrant."

That is pretty descriptive of his sturdy build, but he knows how to get the best use of those powerful shoulders, arms and legs that in no way detract from his speed and shifty tactics, but rather adds to his smooth style. It took him to the Island heavyweight title over former champion "Big Boy" Peterson here a month or so ago.

Cobey deserves a lot of credit and this column for one, would like to extend its congratulations to him for a performance that all local boxing fans can be proud of, and wish him plenty of the same for the future. It is too bad that it is a non-title scrap, but there is one thing sure, and that is that his Monday night performance will or should, get him an official title crack at Durelle's middleweight title.

CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES, South March, Ont., Aug. 15—Cpl. F. Jermy, of the R.C.E.M.E., Montreal, today captured the J.C. Patterson Cup, scoring 98 out of a possible 100 in the Bankers Match at the 82nd Dominion of Canada Rifle Association shoot.

Cpl. Jermy, fighting a stiff breeze and occasional overcast skies, tied with W. O. Tom Gregory, R.C.A.F., Ottawa, who conceded the match to Jermy during a shoot-off later.

Seven other riflemen carded scores of 97 and 10 posted 96's in the 248 entries from 300 and 600 yards.

Those posting 97's included M. G. Lewis of Calgary and Cpl. J. F. Vallance, Brandon, Man.

The match is open to all members of the Association and with the cup presented by the late Hon. J. C. Patterson, formerly Minister of Militia, and also a challenge cup presented by the late Major-Gen. Lord Aylmer and the late Anson A. Gard, for team competition.

The statistical office disclosed today that two teams have tied for team honors in the Tyro Match which was shot off yesterday for the Steinhardt Trophy, open to all marksmen under the age of 19.

Tied with scores of 279 are a six-man team from Ontario and a six-man team from the New Brunswick Rifle Association. They shot off for top honors but the tie could not be broken.

CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES, South March, Ont., Aug. 15—(OP)—A four-man team from the Prince Edward Island Regiment was announced today as winners of the Barlow Match shot yesterday at the 82nd annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association shoot.

They posted a score of 184 with no misfires to better two other teams, Army Headquarters of Ottawa, and the Governor-General's Foot Guards, also of Ottawa, who also posted scores of 184.

Final Upset Features Opening Matinee Racing Meet Here Yesterday

Coming through with an upset performance after placing fifth and third in the first two dashes of the Old Spain Classified Pace, Harold Cudmore's Prince Budlong added the final thrill to a smart racing bill at the opening Old Home Week Matinee Meet yesterday afternoon when he clipped off the final dash on the card over Indiana Boy from R. R. Brown's Woodstock, N.B. stables to produce the biggest pari-mutuel payoff of the season for a single two dollar bet.

Taking over the lead from the quarter-mark on, Cudmore piloted his own horse home a winner to pay-off six ticket holders the sum of \$166.60 each.

It was not a perfect day for racing, with cool, damp and cloudy weather and a fresh breeze prevailing, but despite this some 15,000 fans turned out to witness the three classified pace events that produced some keen racing in a total of nine dashes.

In the number four classified pace, sponsored by the Hughes Drug Company, Lt.-Col. D. A. MacKinnon, P. E. I.'s dean of the three classified paces, handled the event. Making the winning drive a three-way split, Buster C. Truro, N. S., won a close decision in the middle dash over Indiana Boy, after driver Angie Allan took him out from a third position at the three-quarter pole in a powerful last-quarter drive to the finish wire.
