International Sanitary Conference.

England and France at Loggerheads.

BERLIN, Jan. 6.

The German consul at Cairo is here, having been summoned home for the purpose of receiving instructions as to the attitude he shall adopt at the international sanitary conference to be held shortly in Vienna.

It is believed that England and France will come to loggerheads at this conference over the question of the proper measures to be enforced in Egypt to protect that country, more particularly to protect Europe against the spread of cholera and other plagues having their origin in the East and tending to become disseminated by the caravans of Mohammedan pilgrims.

France has named certain measures deemed requisite, but England has refused to sanction them. The Russian delegate will support the contention of France, and the German delegates will probably side with England, since the indications are that the meeting is to degenerate into a political tug-of-war.

WINTER PORT QUESTION.

Facilities Wanted at St. John

ST. JOHN, Jan. 6.

A meeting of citizens last night discussed the winter port and Atlantic service questions. Resolutions were adopted setting out that the only equitable arrangement for winter is a subsidy for a line from England one week direct to Halifax, and the alternate week direct to St. John; that the Dominion Government furnish this port with adequate wharves for shipping grain, elevator and other deep water accommodations; also provide better warehousing accommodations, do the dredging required and provide coaling facilities in connection with the Intercolonial Railway, as provided at Halifax.
