Farming Hit In Some Areas By Cold Spring Weather

An unusually cold spring with killing frosts has hit farming hard in parts of Canada, particularly in Ontario and Quebec.

But in some parts of the Maritimes planting of crops may be earlier than last year, a Cross-Canada Survey by The Canadian Press showed. And in British Columbia weather generally has been good for crops. On the Prairies a surge of warm air, producing temperatures in the 70s, is spreading eastward. It is replacing cold wet conditions in Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

Prairie farmers say one or two weeks of good farming weather will enable them to catch up. The seeding picture in Saskatchewan, for instance, is about the same as last year when the province produced a bumper wheat crop.

FEAR DROUGHT
The central Canadian frosts have held up planting of vegetables, killed those in the ground and held back growth of grain and fruit trees. Dry weather brought fear of a second year of drought to farmers in eastern Ontario and western Quebec.

In the Prairies the near-record temperatures improved field conditions in most Alberta areas. The warm, sunny weather brightened the outlook for farmers who had coped with a cold wet spring.

Alberta moisture conditions were good to excellent and the Alberta Wheat Pool said seeding was a little ahead of the same time last year. Saskatchewan Wheat Pool reports said warm, dry conditions this week will mean seeding will be common through most of the province by the weekend. The pool said it expects the 1966 wheat crop to get off to a good start.

Warm weather easing into Manitoba was expected to put an end to unseasonal cold. Temperatures have been 15 to 20 degrees below average for early May. The agricultural department said one or two weeks of good weather is needed to bring general seeding.

SEEDING IS LATE
Ontario's planting generally was more than a week late because of record cold. But the weather bureau in Toronto said temperatures should rise this afternoon and be back to normal by the weekend. The forecast came after the mercury dropped to as low as 19 degrees at Kapuskasing overnight.

Farming conditions in Ontario varied.

"We are not too greatly concerned at present," said E. K. Pearson, Waterloo's agricultural representative.

But in eastern Ontario, rain and warmer weather were needed.

"The widow of last year's crippling drought still hangs over their heads," said a Frontenac County's agricultural representative, E. R. Jennings.

Wheat, pasture and hay crops in the Ottawa Valley were hard hit by winter kill. Thousands of cattle were sold in the valley after the 1965 drought to provide money for feed.

NOW 16 DAYS LATE
The unusual cold delayed pasture growth in Quebec province and put it about 10 days to two weeks behind last year. Quebec farmers "needed a particularly good crop this year and are getting a bad one," said Dr. John Budar of Macdonald College department of agronomy.

"This is more serious this year than it has been in the past because the crops were so bad last year that most farmers ran out of hay during the winter."

Seeding was reported behind in almost all Nova Scotia sections. But below normal temperatures haven't damaged fruit buds in the apple-growing Annapolis Valley.

Despite recent cold and snow in New Brunswick, planting in the northern district could begin two weeks earlier than 1965, said a spokesman for the provincial agriculture department. The main damage in Prince Edward Island was frost killing newly planted potatoes. A spokesman for the federal department of agriculture in St. John's said the weather in Newfoundland "has been terrible" and has had an adverse effect on crops.

Bluenoses And Herring-Chokers

OTTAWA (CP) - Conservative Senator Clement A. O'Leary of Nova Scotia was sailing right along in a fisheries development debate in the Senate when suddenly he floundered.

"We herring-chokers... it began, thus invading the provincial rights of New Brunswick and inciting the provincial pride of Senator A. J. Brooks (PC-New Brunswick).

"You," the New Brunswick senator told Senator O'Leary, are "a bluenose." Only residents of New Brunswick are herring-chokers.

The bone of contention never was really settled, as Senator O'Leary refused to take the bait and went on to say that the Canadian fishing industry "just isn't keeping pace" with such other countries as Russia, Iceland and Norway.

After second reading, the bill to provide for the development of commercial fisheries was referred to the banking and commerce committee for further study.

Gunnar Mining Shows Net Loss

TORONTO (CP) - Gunnar Mining Ltd. had a net loss of \$12,260,455 last year compared with a loss of \$5,938,007 in 1964, the company said here.

President T. P. O'Connor attributed the loss to operations of the company's construction subsidiary, McNamara Corp., which Gunnar acquired after a long and protracted family squabble in 1963.

Mr. O'Connor said the expansion in the construction subsidiary two years ago was "too great and too fast." He said estimates of costs of some of the larger jobs had since proved inaccurate.

Last September a consortium of five of the company's bankers holding \$45,500,000 of Gunnar's debt undertook an active part in running the company. This debt has since been reduced to \$27,000,000.
