Mr. Robertson Expires at Half-past One O'clock.

The city was started at about one o'clock today by the report that Charles E. Robertson, C.C., one of our best-known and most highly popular citizens, had met with a terrible train accident at Kensington, while on his way to the Summer side races.

Mr. Robertson left Charlottetown in the special train which left here at 10 o'clock this forenoon for the races at Summerside. There were about sixty persons on board.

The accident happened about 12 o'clock. The train conveyed the injured man to Clark's Hotel near by, where he was attended by seven doctors, five of whom were on the train at the time.
