War Veteran and Abbie Star Dies Suddenly Here Sunday

One of the great Aborigine stars of the 1920's Harry Morgan died unexpectedly Sunday morning in the Charlottetown Hospital.

The late Mr. Morgan lived practically all his life in Charlottetown where he was born some 68 years ago. In World War I, he went overseas with the 10th Battalion and was decorated with the military medal. During World War II, he served with the Volant's Guard in Canada and spent most of his service in Northern Quebec.

In hockey circles his name was widely known through the Maritimes. He played in nets for the great Abbies' team to the end of his career. One of the best over the top in this province, later he performed with the Intermediate Veterans in the Holy Redeemer (Sofball) and Volleyball leagues where flourishing back in 1957, Harry Morgan was much to the fore as an active follower of professional hockey.

Two Island Communities Set For Blood Donor Competition

The big push is on this week in P.E.I. for blood donors at this blood donor week.

Red Cross supervisors, Mark Gallant of New Glasgow, and Bert Blagiere of North Rustico, will be battling it out for honors today to see who will be able to surpass his quota.

Mr. Gallant's clinic will be held in Hunter River at the Central Queen Regional High School from 2 to 4 p.m. while Mr. Blagiere's will be held from 1 to 3 p.m. at the Stella Maris Auditorium in North Rustico.

Each will be out to get as many donors as possible in an effort to win the Manning Trophy which is given to the community obtaining the highest percentage of donors in relation to his quota.

Although they are trying for the trophy, both men emphasized that first of all comes the necessity of blood donors and they are hoping that many people would give. They said that it was more than worth the few minutes spent giving blood when you know a life could be saved by it.

The quota at Hunter River has been set at 120 pints and 120 pints for North Rustico. Local supervisors are urging their addressees to enable them to meet their quota as blood is needed as never before.

At the blood donor competition, a staff of 12 Red Cross workers including two nurses and seven nurses aids have come to the island.

(Continued From Page 1) She is the youngest of her 17 children and she is 17 when she told her aristocratic Buddhist mother: "If you don't talk with logic... I shall ignore you."

FAMILY ROYALTY Her mother was member of the former royal family, her father an intellectual who was descended from an old Madri-dar family.

Recently Mrs. Ngo told Marguerite Higgins of the New York Herald Tribune in an interview that she was a Buddhist because it had "shock value" in connection with the monks' sacrifices was deliberate because it had "shock value."

She was quoted by Miss Higgins as saying "It is necessary somehow to show the world of this trance in which it looks at South Viet Nam with utterly false vision about religious persecution which does not exist."

In like vein she wrote a tart letter to the New York Times last week demanding: "What is the use of the word 'Buddhist' in connection with the so-called Buddhist affair?"

He was asked kind words for her mother, who has been thought of as the woman who served with the South Viet Nam delegation at the United Nations.

MOTHER 'FANATIC' Miss Higgins quotes Mrs. Ngo as saying her mother "is a fanatic, although she does not know it and she would like to be a five-year-old child."

Of her father, Tran Van Chuong, she says he was famed out of Washington as ambassador to the United States and who professed her "barbaric" characterization, Mrs. Ngo said: "He is a coward."

The New York Times editorially re-monstrated with her assertions that she would tear hands if the bones-Buddhist priests were beaten 10 times more and killed themselves.

Her answer was: "If one has no courage to denounce, if one is not mad and stupidly, how can one ever hope to cope with other wrongs of humanity exploited in the same fashion by Communists?"

It was in terms as blunt as these that the late Associated Press writer Malcolm W. Browne wrote in 1961: "The Communists look for confusion to make gains. They are like the doll Soviet Premier Khrushchev gave to Caroline Kennedy. You push it down but when you give your hand away it pops up again. Confusion of line is common in U.S. policy."
