OUR BOYS.

It is very pleasing to learn that the conduct of the boys of the Boys' Brigade, which left camp last evening, was exceedingly good. The fact is the more reassuring and gratifying when we remember that "the boy is the father of the man" and that the future of our country depends upon the conduct of the men of the future. We hope that the zeal and strict attention to duty which has been characteristic of "The Boys' Brigade" in camp, will continue to be characteristic of our boys and men in every sphere and relation of life. Those who won the trophy are to be congratulated. They were in "a hot, competition." Their success, we learn turned upon the fraction of a point. This fact will teach our young aspirants the importance of care and attention to every detail of learning and of practice. It will be remembered, too, that the same principle operates in respect to the winning of the prizes of life. Very much to the point was the excellent sermon of the Rev. Mr. Withycombe, addressed to our boys on Sunday last, from the suggestive text, "Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor standeth in the way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful." Mr. Withycombe, Mr. Williams, Colonel Moore, Majors McDougall and Stewart, Captains Watts, Grey, Miller and all the men who actively interested themselves in the boys' camp of this year are to be highly commended for their work. The conduct and drill of the boys reflect credit upon them; and we trust that they will be numbered among those who "budded better than they knew." We had all along entertained the opinion that there are no boys like our boys, and no boys worthier of training in the way they should go.

SPANISH FINANCES.

The tone of the people of Spain has greatly improved since the war. Mistortune has done them good. They seem to have settled down to business—grumbling somewhat about the additional taxes—by working hard to overcome their difficulties. Their statesmen have succeeded largely in the conversion of their floating debt into good terms. A loan of £48,000,000—\$1,000,000,000—has been obtained, by the sale of bonds bearing interest at 5 per cent., and running fifty years, at 83—so that the actual interest is 6 per cent. The remarkable fact of the business is that the loan has been taken up by the people of the Spanish towns, no less than \$328,000,000—about ten times the amount asked for—having been subscribed. This fact goes to show that Spain is not by any means in a state of bankruptcy and that the influential people of the country have decided to stand by and uphold the constituted authorities.

—The bishop of Winchester declares that difficulties of belief cut no figure as the cause of the shortage of curates experienced in the English church. He lately said: "A curate is not troubled with doubts philosophic or otherwise. The controversies and strife of the last few years might be regarded by the general public as occupying the time and thought of the average English priest; but the bishops know that this was not the case, and that for one man who had given his thoughts to these disputations there were fifty who were going straight on with their work and not giving a thought to these controversies at all.
