# Provincial Gov't Ready to Protest

Any move to close RCAF station Summerdale will result in a "protest in the strongest language," Acting Premier J. David Stewart stated Saturday when asked about what action the provincial government might take against the federal government making such a move.

The matter will be discussed by the cabinet at the first of this week," he said, "and we will get something out of Ottawa."

Mr. Stewart said the proposal of moving the RCAF Station "is extremely unfair." He said "it is the province's number one industry, and our only defence industry. Closing the base in this province will have greater impact than closure of a base in any other province. Most other provinces have several such defence industries. It would be more logical to move the base to Greenwood."

The acting premier suggested that there is not much point in giving the Atlantic Development Board \$100,000,000 to step up the economy of the area on one hand "and taking away our number one industry on the other."

In conclusion, he said "the provincial government will make a formal protest over any planned move of the Summerdale station."
