

Savings Bank Deposits.

There would, perhaps, be some force in the *Herald's* contention that the deposits in the Savings Bank have so largely increased because timid individuals withdrew their deposits from the Company banks and placed them where they are secured by the Dominion Government, if the amounts deposited in the "Company Banks" were diminished. But, the fact is, deposits in the banks of Charlottetown have, since 1873, increased to the extent of over \$500,000. The latest returns available to us give the deposits at the three City banks as follows:

Bank P. E. I. (Sept. 18, 1873)	\$223,888.01
Union Bank (March, 1880)	418,356.38
Merchants Bank (March, 1880)	94,995.23

The available returns nearest the 1st July, 1873, show the deposits to be—

This is apart from the amount on the Merchants' Bank of Halifax—a branch of which was established here a few years ago. Added to the increase in the Savings Bank since June 30, 1873 (\$466,711.29), the increased deposits in our banks amount to over a million dollars. Is it necessary for us to say any more in order to show that the *Herald* is wrong?

The Pacific Railway.

THE Toronto "Telegram" says: "The long and short of the discussion of the Canada Pacific Railway question seems to be this: that as the representatives of the people in Parliament have decided that the road must be built without unnecessary delay, the way in which it can be built with least pressure upon the people is the best way to build it. It is altogether likely that the road will be handed over to a company—not only to build it but to run it after it is built, so that the people will have no risk in the matter at all, and will not be further taxed in regard to it. If it is built by a company, one of the first results will be to bring a large amount of money into the country for labor, instead of a large amount being taken out for interest. England is overflowing with money at present, seeking investment; so that Sir John should have little difficulty in bringing negotiations to a close."

A Fraud.

WE are informed that the notices calling for 500 laborers to work in St. Stephen, New Brunswick, are merely a trap for discontented men. In response to similar notices, it is said that a number of poor men went over there in the spring; and, having spent their last dollar on the passage, were obliged, after a long search for employment, to work at nominal wages until something should turn up. It would have been better for them had they rather borne the ills they complained of here than flown to others they knew not of.

The Prince Imperial Memorial.

A London despatch of the 19th inst. states that owing to the pressure which has been brought to bear upon him in reference to the erection of a monument to the late Prince Napoleon in Westminster Abbey, Dean Stanley has decided not to insist upon his original project. It is now said that the statue will be placed in St. George's chapel, Windsor Castle, with the Queen's approval. To this it is not thought any serious objection can be raised in any quarter.

The Execution of Bennett.

THE murderer of George Brown suffers to-day. It is stated that Bennett keeps calm, and spends most of his time, when not engaged with his priest, in writing. The following is from a poem he composed since he went to gaol:—

This world to me is dark and drear,  
Fond death, on you I wait;  
The hours are quickly passing by,  
My day is growing late.  
On God alone I place my trust,  
My life I freely give,  
In peace await His kind release  
From out this living grave.

Late Crop Reports.

THE latest reports are to the effect that crops in France, Germany and Russia are likely to turn out better than was anticipated at one time—that, in fact, they will show a fair average. In Ireland the crops look well; but considerable damage is reported in the low-lying lands of England. In the Western and Northern States drought has caused much alarm, and the crops will probably be short on account of it.

The Irish Land Difficulty.

In a late London letter it is stated that "The dislike of the landed interest to the Compensation for Disturbances Bill has produced its effect. The Government now proposes to alleviate the hardships which it would inflict upon Irish landlords. A tenant is not to be able to enforce compensation for eviction if he has neglected or refused to sell his tenant right, after having received his landlord's permission to do so. This proposal, if carried, will practically extend the Ulster custom to the distressed districts, and in due course, to the whole of Ireland. The only objection that can be urged against it is the haste with which the Government seeks to introduce a very important change into the relations between landlord and tenant. It is generally considered a very considerable improvement of the bill, for tenants will be compelled to satisfy their landlords either one way or the other, and no encouragement will be given to those who, in defiance of the rights of property, have hoped to keep their farms without paying any rent at all. Nevertheless, it is evident that Irish legislation is being conducted upon very hasty principles. Such a necessary provision should not, in justice to the landlords, have been omitted from the first draft of the bill."

Summerside Items.

The non-appearance of Nannery & Lindley's Company here, as advertised was quite a disappointment to our people. We understand that quite a large number of tickets were sold. As the company did not come, the money was refunded. They would have had a full house.

The annual picnic of the Sunday School scholars of the Methodist Church was held at Schurman's Point on Wednesday last. A large number of scholars and their friends attended. They spent a very pleasant time at the point. The only thing which happened to dampen their spirits was in coming home, when the boats, loaded with children, went aground on the flats. It was late at night when they arrived at the wharf.

The Tea held at Alberton on Wednesday last was well patronized. A train of fifteen cars passed through here with passengers.

On Exhibition Day ample provision will be made to supply visitors with "good things." The Ladies of the Methodist Church intend having a Refreshment table. The Ladies of the Baptist Church also intend providing one.

Jon McKenzie, Esq., is spoken of as a candidate for the vacancy in the Town Council. It is not likely there will be any opposition, as in the course of a few weeks a new Council will have to be elected.

David Montgomery, Esq., met with a severe accident the other day. While examining his new vessel, he fell from the scaffolding, a distance of twenty feet, and broke his arm just above the wrist, besides sustaining some other injuries. Mr. Montgomery is able to be about, although it is evident he got badly shaken.

The Baptist Church here has secured the services of the Rev. W. B. Hinson, who will enter upon his duties as pastor of the church on Sunday next.

House-building and repairing is the order of day in Norborough.

Neil McKelvie, Esq., the obliging manager of the Union Bank here, started on Tuesday morning on a pleasure trip to the Upper Provinces. Mr. Green, who has been appointed accountant of the above Bank, will be in charge during Mr. McKelvie's absence.

Bears have been making considerable destruction in Pitsville among the sheep of late. Several dead carcasses have been found partly devoured within the last few days. About fifty men, well armed, scoured the woods on Saturday, but Bruin, it seems, put them all at defiance.

Paul Snake, a nephew of Chief Joseph whose death we chronicled a few weeks ago, died at the camp, at the head of Central street, on Thursday morning last. Paul was an aged man, being in his 84th year.

The report that the Canada Temperance Act would not come into force in this year is a mistake. Some of our citizens have made proper inquiry into the matter, and find that everything has been done according to law, so that now there is nothing to prevent its coming into force on the 2nd August next.

The singular disappearance of Mr. Alex. Campbell, manager of the Campbell tobacco factory at Montreal, has taken place. Mr. Campbell was formerly manager of McDonald's tobacco factory for 18 years, but about two years ago, he mysteriously left the city, it was said at the time, for domestic troubles. After a lengthened absence, no one knowing where he was and it being surmised he had committed suicide, he returned. Being a man of the greatest experience in the manufacture of tobacco, he induced Messrs. Matthew Hodgson, Ed. McKay, Wm. Smith, and Charles Ault Stark, to form a company, obtain a charter, and appoint him manager. A building was obtained and every preparation made, at a large outlay, for commencing business, when Mr. Campbell was not to be found and for the past ten days has the most active search failed to obtain any clue to his whereabouts. Insinuations are openly made that he has been bribed by other manufacturers to leave the city, as his superior knowledge of tobacco mixing gave him a great advantage in the trade. As matters stand, his unfortunate dupes are placed in an embarrassing position and will suffer serious pecuniary loss.
