

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. WILLIAM CURRIE

On the morning of October 10th the many friends of Mrs. William Currie were sadly shocked and grieved to hear of her passing in her seventy-first year.

Although not enjoying the best of health for some months, she attended to her household duties until she entered the Charlottetown Hospital about five weeks previous to her death.

Falling to respond to the treatment of her physician and tender nursing of sisters and nurses, she will be missed by all who knew her.

During her illness she was visited by her pastor, Reverend T. E. Butler, Rev. F. J. Lynch, S.J., rector of St. Mary's College, Halifax, and Reverend Monsignor Maurice McDonald, who administered the last sacraments.

The deceased, who was formerly Catherine A. Trainor, was born at Glenfinnan, the daughter of James P. Trainor and Mary A. Cumiskey.

In the year of 1905 she became the wife of William Currie and lived in Tarantum for twenty years; the remainder of her life she spent in Mt. Ryan.

In her home she will be sadly missed for she was most kind, hospitable and charitable and was a true wife and mother, who spared nothing for the comforts and joys of her home and family.

Her husband having predeceased her fifteen years ago, she was left with a two-fold duty to perform. Three years later she bore with Christian courage the loss of her eldest son Joseph.

HIGH WYCOMBE Buckinghamshire, England, Nov. 13 —(CP)—

The Queen saw Monday for the first time pictures of herself on British postage stamps.

At a large printing shop here she met the stamp designers, then watched a large force of girls inspecting the sheets of stamps as they shot out of presses at the rate of 480,000 an hour. The public will see them late this year.
