Lieut-Governor Bowlen Keeps A Busy Schedule

The following article from the Edmonton News of June 18th is of interest to Governor Bowlen's many friends in his native province of Prince Edward Island.

Back from a restful vacation in Balmby California, Alberta's Lieutenant Governor has resumed his rigorous itinerary of social and business functions. Hon. Dr. John James Bowlen will be 83 years old July 21, the first day of the Queen's visit to Edmonton.

Recently, Dr. Bowlen took in the Highland Ball in Calgary. Earlier he was on hand to welcome 75 American V.I.P.'s taking part in the Western Airlines inaugural flight from U.S. points to Calgary.

The Governor was in Banff for the two-day meeting of the Canadian Investment Dealers' Association, and on June 10 he went to Lethbridge for the annual commemoration of the Grand Lodge of Alberta of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons.

The ranch, farmer and former member of the Alberta Legislature enjoys his official and ceremonial duties. He arrives at his office, which overlooks the front steps of the Legislative Building, every morning at 7.15 well before the hundreds of civil

servants. Once a month he visits his 4,000 acre ranch near Calgary to get away from the office routine.

The native Prince Edward Islander has never actually taken sick leave. During the odd bout with the flu the Governor's secretary, Mel Wright, brings the work to the Governor's hospital bedside. The Governor is giving hardly any thought to retirement and would only resign the post if his health demanded it.

A speculative report by an Edmonton radio station that Conservative J. Percy Page would become the next Lieutenant-Governor came as a surprise and embarrassment to all concerned, including Prime Minister Diefenbaker who ultimately makes the appointment.

Officials close to the federal government described the report as "entirely and absolutely untrue" and pointed out the appointment is not up for consideration because the term of Lieutenant-Governor Bowlen was extended indefinitely after his five-year term expired in 1955.

The rumor was quickly dispelled to allow Mr. Page to campaign in Edmonton Jasper West where he is seeking re-election.

Tragic Situation Is Not All Wife's Fault

Dear Mary Haworth: I was 18, and Hank was 19 and in the army when we married six years ago. I am neurotic in the sense that I feel unloved and inferior, and I don't know why, as my parents have been wonderful and spoiled me with kindness.

Hank is the opposite from me, very self-assured, even though his parents aren't the doting type. At the start we were very compatible and very happy, as he appreciated everything I did and quickly coddled me into good humor if I pouted.

We wanted the same things—a nice home and family, sharing life together, helping each other. I was beginning to love people and think of others besides myself, and I didn't hate myself any more. But after Hank left the Army he started spending more time with his friends, leaving me at home, which annoyed me terribly out of all proportion.

However, the big money wrench in the machinery of your marriage, that has done most of the damage, is his sit-down strike against being a man in the partnership.

Indirectly, he has forced you to be the breadwinner, driven you to wearing the pants economically while he stays home in the sheltered role, minding the kids, doing maid's work, picking up his unemployment check, and playing at being a student at government expense—as a form of recreation.

CHARACTER COMING APART.
When a husband and father gets so far off the beam of being a man, his character starts coming apart at the seams. He loses self-respect and a sense of purpose, becomes progressively no-account, and avoids straight talk with the wife he cheats. He keeps out of her way; due to defensive defiant flings of sham, as the record of injustice mounts—which is very much the background of your latest quarrel with Hank.

On the other hand, your up-stage attitude, at being the strong one, the real pack-bearer, in the alliance, and your unconscious contempt for Hank's slacker behavior, hasn't helped. But weighing your worth, versus his, to date, you are a heroine and he is a heel.

What to do? Get first-hand guidance from a family relations specialist, at the family service centre for your county—located in the town through which you write. You must have disinterested professional guidance, from an expert who knows all the facts, in order to come to sound terms with Hank.
